### THE SCHOOL LIEN LANDS.

The Dalles Chronicle says that the fact that money is extorted from purchasers of school lien lands in addition to the statutory price, is well known in Wasco county, and that names of persons who have been compelled to pay these additional amounts can be furnished without difficulty.

This is true here in Umatilla county. The citizens who have been defrauded of money by a go-between in their dealings with the state school land board are easily accessible.

Before the matter be taken up by others, however, it would be a graceful act of Governor Geer to order an investigation of the methods of the state school board, and see to it that anything that is wrong is righted; or, if nothing be wrong, then proclaim it to the world.

Governor Geer is about to ask a re-nomination at the hands of his party. Can he afford to ignore charges that are made against his administration, and go into the campaign with the certainty of having to be all the time upon the defensive? This will be poor tactics. The man who wins battles does not allow himself to be placed upon the defensive, especially in politics. It is a maxim familiar to all who have studied the game of politics, that when you have a man on the defensive, you have him beaten.

There is ample time in which to purge the administration from the imputation of crookedness, and this Governor Geer should do between now and next convention day, when he will be an applicant for the place on the head of the republican ticket.

(Since the preceding was put into type, Governor Geer has sent to the Portland Oregonian a letter on the subject, which will receive attention in the East Oregonian tomorrow. Let it be said, for the moment, that Governor Geer might long ago have turned his attention to the matter, and obviate the necessity for any one not connected with the administration bringing it up. If, as the governor hints, he can show that all is well, he will have no cause to feel hardy towards the East Oregonian for having been the instrument whereby an unjust imputation has been cleared up. The issue is now directly joined, and in shape to be thoroughly investigated. The East Oregonian desires here to say that Governor Geer will receive impartial treatment and fair consideration at the hands of this paper.)

### VAN SANT'S COURAGE

Let the fight against the railway merger result as it may, it cannot be denied that Governor Van Sant, of Minnesota, has exhibited a fine courage in taking up the issue and determining to exhaust all means at his command to prevent the consolidation. He may fail, and he probably will fail. The power of the combine is too great for a state legislature to overcome it. Legislatures as a rule are too easily influenced to afford hope that they would take action looking towards prevention of the ends of the men who control modern railway affairs in Wall Street.

This remark is predicated upon the assumption that the tendency towards concentration is not calculated to bring good to the people. And this is the present view of most persons. Perhaps it may be wise, however, to give up a fight against what appears to be a resistless trend in the progress of society and industry, and just accept without further question Edward Bellamy's plan for the organization of human affairs—state ownership and the complete elimination of individualism.

This nation is not yet ready to do, and therefore, inasmuch as trusts are regarded as harmful, and Missa sets has written into its statutes a prohibition against combination of competing lines, Governor Van Sant's movement, which is believed to be sincere on his part, is proof that he proposes to be faithful to the charge imposed on him by the people of his state.

While the Herald has not been authorized to so state, this paper I feel to believe that not only is Mr. Bowen not a candidate, but that absolutely he would not accept the nomination were it tendered him.
