### NOT MAKING MUCH MUTTON

THE BIG CHICAGO  
PACKERS NOT FEEDING.

Usually Swift & Co. Have 50,000  
Sheep Fattening, But Now Have  
Only 20,000.

T. A. Sullivan, representing L. P. Southwick, a large feeder and buyer for the Swift Packing company, of Chicago, is in the city, and in an interview he stated that his company was not buying much stock to feed this year. They have only in the neighborhood of 20,000 head of sheep feeding in California, and none in Nebraska, where, heretofore they have fed on an average of 50,000 or 60,000 each year. This is owing to the shortage of the Nebraska corn crop, which has caused the price of that cereal to be too high for profitable feeding.

### WILD IMPERIAL DREAMS.

Seattle Times Says Really was a Plot  
in Klondike.

Of all the wild dreams of empire since the days of Louis Rell, that concocted by a little band of plotters scattered along the valley of the Yukon from the upper lakes to Circle City is probably the most fantastic yet recorded. A few days ago the Associated Press sent out from San Francisco a story of the exposure of the conspiracy at Skagway and of hurried measures that were taken by both Canadian and American officials to thwart the scheme of the plotters to make of the Yukon and Northwest territory a republic. The story was discounted at the time by persons claiming to be informed concerning Alaskan matters. The Times has, however, secured absolutely authentic information that will tend to confirm the first story of the plot to overthrow

British authority in the gold fields of the Yukon.

Proof that such a conspiracy existed is furnished in documents now in the possession of the Times and which were obtained from one of the ring leaders in the plot. Copies of these documents and papers are reproduced in this issue, as well as "testimonials" of the seals of the organization which was formed for the concerted purpose of wresting the gold-bearing country of the far north from the control of the Canadians.

The organization was formed in December, 1900, at Dawson. Its headquarters for months last summer was at Skagway. It was called the Order of the Midnight Sun. Its members took a late raising oath to reveal none of its secrets. Death was the penalty for violation of this oath. It might have succeeded temporarily, as did Rell when he invaded the north-west territory with a band of half-breeds. But the leaders of the conspiracy lacked the requisite nerve. Some one "leaked" and the organization, it is believed, will disappear as quietly and completely as do the snowbanks along the reaches of the upper Yukon with the first warm rays of the sun in May.
