WITH THE PADDED PLAYERS

THE THANKSGIVING FOOTBALL GAME HERE.

Pendleton Academy Expects to Win From Goldendale, But Teams' Strength is Unknown.

Goldendale Academy's eleven will reach here on No. 2 this evening for the game with Pendleton Academy, on Alta street grounds tomorrow afternoon. They will not probably be accompanied by many supporters on account of poor railroad facilities at Klickitat's capital. The game promises to be one of the most exciting of the season. It will be called at 2:30. Pendleton will line up as follows: Center, Shuck; quarter, Roy Penland; full back, Stusher; right half, Hill, captain; left half, Sullivan; right end, Froome; left end, Strand; right tackle, Kennedy; left tackle, Cargill; right guard, Hamblin; left guard, Hailey. No line-up from Goldendale has been received. Roscoe Bryson, of Pendleton, will be one of the presiding officers, and the other will come from Goldendale.

A peculiar prospective interest attaches to this game, because of the delightful element of uncertainty entering into it. Practically nothing is known of the remote Klickitat team, and there is nothing to go by in an attempt to make comparisons of relative strength. If last year's game between the competing elevens at Goldendale is any criterion, Pendleton should win, as last year she defeated a picked aggregation by 11 to 5, though exceeded considerably in weight. The locals this year average about 145 pounds. The weight of the visitors is expected to pass this figure somewhat.

Expect to Win.
Manager R. S. Pond said this afternoon: "We are putting a strong team in the field and expect to win. The academy is in better shape than at the first of the season when it lined up against the scouring mill. We have a new quarter, a new full, a new left guard and the whole team has had the advantage of several weeks more careful coaching. The men are in good condition and full of enthusiasm. That is why we expect to come out ahead."

The football season has but nicely opened up for the academy eleven. Three more good games are in prospect, and it is not known how many more may be arranged. Saturday, December 7, the rival academy and high school teams will meet, and two matches with the strong Walla Walla high school aggregation are in prospect. Tomorrow the scouring mill team will meet the plucky Heppner eleven, jumping out for a game with Wasco on Friday, and playing the well organized Dalles football men on Saturday. With three hard games in as many days, a little anxiety is felt locally for the boys from the mill.

THE MEDICOS GATHERED

PHYSICIANS MEET TO ORGANIZE TODAY.

They Will Dine at Hotel Pendleton This Evening and Hear Speeches.

Physicians from almost every town in Umatilla county, a sprinkling from outside counties and Washington, four representatives of the profession from Portland, and a representative of the American Medical association, met at 2:45 this afternoon in the rooms of the Commercial Association to organize the doctors of Umatilla into a medical society, and consider the advisability of making the new born body a member of the American Medical association. The general sentiment of the physicians entering the meeting this afternoon was for organization locally. No opposition was apparent to the proposition of becoming affiliated with the American Medical association at Chicago, membership in which is supposed to give reputable standing to minor organizations. The headquarters of the large society is at Chicago, the well-known "Journal of the American Medical Association" being its official organ. Practically all state associations belong.

The objective end in the formation of the Umatilla county medical society is well expressed in the constitution of a former similar association existing here, which stated the end in view as: "The advancement of knowledge and of all subjects related to the healing art, the elevation of character and the study of means calculated to render the medical profession most useful to the public and subservient to the interests of humanity."

This Evening's Program.

This evening the medical men will meet in the rooms of the Commercial Association at 7 o'clock to hear papers not yet specified, but read largely by visiting physicians. According to the original program, local doctors were to take the initiative in making addresses. In courtesy to the visitors, this plan was changed. Specialists of the guests will be the general topics. At 9 o'clock a reception and dinner at the Hotel Pendleton is in order. This over, the customary after dinner speeches and toasts will be supplemented by a lecture by Dr. Woods Hutchinson, of Portland, on "Tuberculosis."

The physicians from Portland are: Dr. Andrew C. Smith, Dr. Harry Lane, Dr. J. F. Dixon, and Dr. Woods Hutchinson. Dr. J. F. Dickson and Dr. Hutch-lake is also present. The organizer of the American Medical Association is C. F. Marshall, of Chicago.

THE JURY TURNS HIM FREE

FRANK E. CROTTO IS DECLARED NOT GUILTY.

But Is Held to Await Genesee, Idaho, Charge.

The case of Frank E. Crotto, who hired a team and buggy from the Commercial stables and failed to return them at the time promised and who was arrested at Canyon City, went into the hands of the jury yesterday afternoon, and after an hour's deliberation, they returned a verdict of not guilty. Before he was released, however, word was received from the officers at Genesee, Idaho, saying to hold him, as his description answered that of a man who came to that city September 23, and represented himself as a St. Louis drummer, hired a team from a liveryman to go into the country, and that was the last seen of either man or team. The Genesee officers are expected here this evening to see if Crotto is the man wanted, and if he is, they will return with him to that place.
