

YOUR TAXES PROMPTLY.

First Monday in April.

Shortff Bishely has sent out printed

To Taxpayers: At the last session ed in regard to the collection of taxes which law takes effect on Decombe-lat, 1901, and in substance is as (a)

1. If you pay your taxes or or be-fore March 15 you will be allowed a

rehate of 2 per cent. 2. If you pay your taxes between March 15th and up to and including the first Monday in April, there will not be any rebate allowed and neither will there be any penalty or interest added.

If your taxes are not paid on or before the first Monday of April they will become delinquent, when there and the tax will also draw interest at the rate of 12 per cent, per annum in

4. If you pay one-half of your taxes on or before the first Monday in April. then the remaining half may run up to and including the first Monday in Oc-tober following: but if the last half of tax due is not paid by the first Monday of October. It becomes delinquent and there will be added to such bal-ance a penalty of 10 per cent, and in addition, such balance will bear interest at the rate of 12 per cent per aneat at the arte of 12 per cent. per an num from the first Monday in April until paid.

5. On all personal property taxes. if one-half is not paid on or before the first Monday in April the law compels the sheriff to levy upon and colject the same after May 1st hence to prevent a levy upon personal property after May 1st, it will be necessary for one-half to be paid as above stated.
