AXE WIELDERS ARRANGE

FOR A LOG ROLLING WITH BAKER CITY CAMP.

Pendleton Woodmen Elect Officers and Appoint a Delegate.

Pendleton Camp, No. 41, Woodmen of the World, met last evening in I. O. O. F. Temple, and elected the following officers for the ensuing term: Consul, J. P. Earl; advisor, A. E. Owen; banker, J. E. Beam; clerk, J. P. Walker; escort, E. D. Kirkpatrick; watchman, C. J. Hilgard; sentry, J. A. Dupuis; manager, J. E. Krause.

They also elected J. P. Walker as a delegate to a convention to be held in Baker City December 18, to arrange for a log rolling of all the camps in Eastern Oregon. The log rolling is expected to be at some central point in this territory some time in March and the Woodmen of the World expect to make this an event in the history long to be remembered. Beside the other business incidental to the camp, three applicants were introduced into the mysteries of Woodcraft. The camp in this city is in a very prosperous condition. It now has an enrollment of 405 members in good standing.

SENDS STRONG DELEGATION

IDAHO HAS A STRONG

WOOL GROWERS ASS'N. Monte B. Gwinn, Secretary, Speaks of the Organization.

Monte B. Gwinn, secretary of the Idaho Wool Growers association, of Boise, was in the city yesterday. Mr. Gwinn says that the Idaho association will send a delegation 200 strong of the largest and most influential sheep men of the state in special cars to the National Livestock and Wool Growers' association to be held in Chicago the first week in December. They expect to take the convention by storm and have resolutions passed and work for measures to be brought before the law-makers of the country which will be to the interest of the greatest number of stockmen, and they hope to accomplish much good toward this end.

Mr. Gwinn says that Idaho has the largest and strongest livestock and wool growers' associations in the Pacific northwest, if not in the United States, that they are well organized and work in harmony for the good of the stockmen, and that their combined efforts for good cannot be estimated. The association has a membership in the state of between 400 and 500.

THE MARKET IS NOW WEAKER

WHEAT GOES OFF HALF

A CENT IN PENDLETON.

Indications Are That No Immediate Improvement Will Occur.

Again there is a slump in local wheat prices. Liverpool and eastern markets were off a little yesterday, and the effect was felt here today. It is quoted at 45 cents, against 46 1/2 for a few days past. Today the Liverpool market opened and closed the same, but had a slight downward tendency, with an outlook for a probable further slump. This condition is not looked upon with favor by the man who has held his wheat in the hopes of realizing 50 cents and local dealers make the statement that indications would lead them to believe that prices would not advance much, if any, in some time to come and the possibility is that it may continue to go down locally.

IT WILL PAY TO PAY

YOUR TAXES PROMPTLY.

Notice Period—Delinquency Begins First Monday in April.

Sheriff Blakely has sent out printed notices that give in detail the legal requirements as to tax paying.

To Taxpayers: At the last session of the legislature a new law was passed in regard to the collection of taxes which law takes effect on December 1st, 1901, and in substance is as follows:

1. If you pay your taxes on or before March 15 you will be allowed a rebate of 3 per cent.

2. If you pay your taxes between March 15th and up to and including the first Monday in April, there will not be any rebate allowed and neither will there be any penalty or interest added.

3. If your taxes are not paid on or before the first Monday of April, they will become delinquent, when there will be added a penalty of 10 per cent and the tax will also draw interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum in addition to the penalty.

4. If you pay one-half of your taxes on or before the first Monday in April, then the remaining half may run up to and including the first Monday in October following; but if the last half of tax due is not paid by the first Monday of October, it becomes delinquent, and there will be added to such balance a penalty of 10 per cent, and in addition, such balance will bear interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum from the first Monday in April until paid.

5. On all personal property taxes, if one-half is not paid on or before the first Monday in April the law compels the sheriff to levy upon and collect the same after May 1st, hence to prevent a levy upon personal property after May 1st, it will be necessary for one-half to be paid as above stated.

6. The law compels the sheriff to sell all lands on which taxes have not been paid, and that such sale shall not be held later than March 1st of the year succeeding the year in which the levy is made.

7. The property will be sold to the person bidding the lowest rate of interest, and certificates will be issued therefor, and deeds given to such property sold, unless redeemed within three years from the date of such sale.
