DOCTORS OF PHISIK

EASTERN OREGON DISTRICT MEDICAL SOCIETY

First Regular Meeting Will be Held In January—Interesting Sessions

During the afternoon and evening of Wednesday the Umatilla county physicians and those from other places held several meetings, and formed an organization to be called "The Eastern Oregon District Medical Society," and of which the temporary officers are: Dr. J. L. Miller, of Pendleton, president; Dr. T. M. Henderson, of Pendleton, secretary. The first regular meeting will be held in January.

Besides the business sessions of Wednesday, the medical society listened to the reading of papers and enjoyed a banquet at the Hotel Pendleton. Dr. Woods Hutchinson, of Portland, the famous specialist on "Tuberculosis" addressed the society and his remarks are today pronounced to have constituted the ablest presentation of that subject ever heard by the physicians who were present.

Dr. Andrew Smith, of Portland, spoke on "Appendicitis." Dr. J. F. Dickson, of Portland, on "Asthma." Dr. Harry Lane, of Portland, on "Insanity." All of them were able efforts.

The meetings were not public, and no laymen were present.

THE DAY WE GIVE THANKS

STREETS DESERTED AND EVERYONE TAKES HOLIDAY.

Services as Usual at Thompson Street M. E. and Church of the Redeemer.

Today, Thanksgiving, the streets are almost deserted. The business houses closed at 12 o'clock and aside from an occasional straggler there is no one in sight. Many of our people have gone away to spend the day with friends in other places, and many have come from the country and adjoining towns to spend the day and partake of the hospitality of our people on this occasion of thanksgiving. Beside the football games, there is little to attract the people out, and most of them are spending the day away from the busy turmoil of business and the streets and are with their families enjoying a holiday at home.

Church of the Redeemer.

Union Thanksgiving services were conducted at the Thompson street M. E. church, of which the Rev. John Uren is pastor, and at the Church of the Redeemer, the Rev. W. E. Portwine is rector, and the Rev. John Warren assistant. At the latter service a handsome silver communion service was presented to the church in honor of the memory of the late William H. Marshall. Appropriate music was rendered by the boys' yeard choir, and at the conclusion of the services the boys were photographed in their vestments. They will cause the framing of the photograph and send it to Mr. E. Y. Judd, who contributed \$100 toward the choir.

Union Services.

The services at the Thompson street M. E. church were conducted by the Rev. R. J. Dixon, pastor of the Presbyterian church. The Rev. R. W. King, the Baptist pastor, read the lesson, and the Rev. F. L. Forbes, of the Pendleton Academy, followed with prayer. The sermon was listened to with much interest by the large audience present and at the close a benediction was taken, as is usual on Thanksgiving day, for the benefit of the poor. Music was furnished by the regular church choir. The Rev. Mr. Jones, pastor of the South Methodist church, dismissed the congregation with the benediction.

W. H. H. SCOTT ROBBED.

Was Held Up Near Athena on Wednesday Night.

Athena, Nov. 28.—W. H. H. Scott was held up near this city last evening and robbed of \$10 and his watch. Mr. Scott and brother were on their way to Athena by team about 7 o'clock and when about a half mile from town a lone highwayman stepped out into the road and demanded that they throw up their hands. This they did and were relieved of the \$10 and watch, all the valuables they had on them.

There is no clue as to the robber, and no description could be given of him.

PRESIDENT BURT CALLED ON PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT.

However, the New York World Special Says Department of Justice at Washington Will Act in Relation to the Railway Combine and Other Trust Matters.

New York, Nov. 28.—The World has the following from Washington: It is now understood that there is a strong probability that the department of justice will take action against the copper trust, the sugar trust and the new railroad trust, under the Sherman anti-trust law, as combinations in restraint of trade, basing such action upon the decision of the United States supreme court in the Trans-Missouri Freight association case. The department of justice officials have reached the conclusion that the Sherman law is adequate, but

will take no action until after the opening of congress.

Great pressure is being brought to bear upon the president to induce him to modify his recommendations relative to trusts. Leading representatives of railroad and other affected interests are trying to head off any drastic recommendations. Several men vitally interested, including J. J. Hill, A. B. Stickley, Thomas J. Lowery and Clinton Morrison, already have been here on such an errand. Colonel D. S. Jamont came Saturday, but the president was out of the city.

Horace M. Burt, of Omaha, president of the Union Pacific, called on President Roosevelt today. He wanted to prevent any direct reference in the president's message to the Northern Securities company. It is said he inquired if it were possible for the president to intimate to Governor Van Sant, of Minnesota, that it would be well to delay his crusade until the department of justice had time to do something. Mr. Burt got little satisfaction at the White House.
