Bringing a Bride and Having Enjoyed Five Months of Travel.

Butter Creek, Nov. 29.—Pat Doherty, after having been gone nearly five months, returned yesterday from "Old Ireland," the scene of his childhood. He did not make this trip only for the purpose of seeing his old home, but brought back with him a bride, who was accompanied by her brother, C. McLaughlin, and Miss Nora and Paul Doherty, cousins of Mr. Doherty. During his absence he stopped at the Pan-American Exposition, where he saw the sights, but says it was not up to the standard of the exposition which he attended at Glasgow, Scotland.

Mr. Doherty says he had a very delightful trip, but is glad to get back to Oregon. He is one of the heaviest sheep owners of this part of the county, and has many friends who extend a hearty welcome to him and his bride.

HUGH FIELDS, PROMINENT OREGONIAN DIED TUESDAY

In Portland—Was Once Sheep King of Eastern Oregon.

Hugh Fields, former president of the Brownsville woolen mills, and who was known all over the state as the "sheep king" of Eastern Oregon, died at the home of his friend, W. R. Bishop, in Portland, Tuesday.
Probably no one in the state was more widely or more favorably known than Mr. Fields, who had property interests in different parts of Oregon. He was the owner of many thousands of sheep. A friend who was well acquainted with him and is familiar with his transactions, classes Mr. Fields as a great benefactor, and says that probably more men had received aid from him which had helped them to gain a start in this world, than from any other man in the state.

Mr. Fields leaves a wife and one daughter, Mrs. Walter Rehan, who is a resident of Pendleton. He was 73 years of age at his death. The remains were shipped to Brownsville for burial.

WOMEN OF WOODCRAFT

And Their First Investment of the Funds of the Order.

On November 13th, in the city of Denver, Colorado, says the Pacific Echo, in the presence of the Board of Grand Managers, Grand Guardian Van Orsdall and Grand Clerk Wright attached their signatures to warrants No. 1 and 2, drawn on the Equalization Fund to the amount of \$41,272.22 for the purchase of bonds which net the fund 4.50 per cent and 3.80 per cent interest.
The pen which was used will be appropriately labeled, framed and hung up in the Grand Clerk's office as a memento of an event which laid the foundation of the permanency of the Women of Woodcraft.

The Equalization Fund went into operation on January 1, 1901, and in less than a year the investment of large sum was possible. These facts and figures speak eloquently for the management of the order, and prove conclusively that business methods and a strict fidelity to business principles are the only real foundations of success in the fraternal insurance field as well as in any other field.
