For the Lands Lying North and West of Barnhart's Station.

On these lands they will bore for water, even going as far as 1000 feet into the "bowels of the earth." they are successful a number of wells will be bored and if water is obtain ed the lands will rise in value from \$5 to \$10 per acre.

At the present time water for farm purposes on these lands has to be hauled a distance of from five to ten miles, and for the lack of water homes are not made on the lands and settlement of them is retarded. Once plenty of water is obtained homes vill start up as if by magic and this section of the county wil be as thickly settled as any part of the count. The enterprise of bese three men is likely to greatly add to the assess. ment roll and otherwise benefit a large number of people.
