### AN IMPORTANT EXPERIMENT

FURNISH, MORRIS AND MARSHALL BORE FOR WATER.

An Effort to be Made to Secure Water For the Lands Lying North and West of Barnhart's Station.

W. J. Furnish, E. P. Marshall and T. J. Morris are making an experiment which may bring great good results to the country, particularly that portion of it west and north of Pendleton, which is not over supplied with water for farm and household purposes. These gentlemen have invested in a big well-boring plant and have taken it to the lands owned by them in the vicinity of Barnhart's Station, about six miles west of Pendleton.

On these lands they will bore for water, even going as far as 1000 feet into the "howels of the earth." If they are successful a number of wells will be bored and if water is obtained the lands will rise in value from \$5 to \$10 per acre.

At the present time water for farm purposes on these lands has to be hauled a distance of from five to ten miles, and for the lack of water homes are not made on the lands and settlement of them is retarded. Once plenty of water is obtained homes will start up as if by magic and this section of the county will be as thickly settled as any part of the county. The enterprise of these three men is likely to greatly add to the assessment roll and otherwise benefit a large number of people.

### GO TO THEIR CLAIMS.

Locators on the Land to the South Will Spend Some Time There.

L. T. Link, L. W. Keeler, Frank Ehrhart, Mart Ehrhart, Mr. Lahue, C. C. Ewert, T. H. Tandy, Miss Bell Wallace and Mrs. N. L. Sturdwant left this morning for the head of Big Butter creek, forty miles from Pendleton, to the south. They are members of the company of people who have taken up quarter sections of land in that locality. They will remain this time for several days and attend to the building of the cabins that are being constructed. Each one will go to his claim and remain there during the coming few days.

### Coming From Iowa.

Thos. Keyes writes from Mitchellville, Iowa, to the East Oregonian for information of Eastern Oregon. He wants to know the price of improved and unimproved farm lands. He wishes to know if there is any railroad land in this section. He says several families will leave that part of Iowa about March 1 for this county and will bring with them three carloads of stock. Mr. Keyes appears to think there are "choice lands" in this section which can be had for the asking. Good lands here are like they are in Iowa, a valuable article. Those who have land to sell or to dispose of can write Mr. Keyes. The real estate agents who advertise in the East Oregonian will probably hear from Mr. Keyes, as marked copies of the East Oregonian containing their ads have been mailed him. A number of letters are received by this paper from the east making inquiries about land, climate, prospects, etc.
