## VERY QUIET AFFAIR

TODAY PENDLETON VOTERS  
ARE SELECTING OFFICERS.

Little interest manifest, by Reason of Fact That There is No Fight On. City election is now being held in Pendleton for the election of a mayor and three councilmen.

T. G. Halley has no opposition for mayor and there are but two candidates for treasurer—H. L. Hasbrouck and Charles Hamilton. There is only one man up for councilman in each ward, and very little interest is being manifest in the selection. E. J. Summerville is the candidate for councilman in the second ward, the voting place being at W. S. Byer's small house, next his residence. W. R. Withie's bicycle shop is the place of election for the second ward, with H. F. Johnson as the candidate. The election for the third ward is at the court house, and T. R. Dickson is the candidate, while Boynton's feed yard is where those of the fourth ward are casting their votes for T. B. Wells. The polls will not close until 5 o'clock and the result of the election will be given tomorrow.

### Weston's Hot Fight.

Weston, Dec. 2.—Friday evening there was a lively primary held in Weston, more interest being shown in the approaching city election than has been usual for the past few years. The names of several prominent citizens had been spoken of on the streets for the last few days as candidates for the mayors' office. But when the ballot was taken only two names appeared. Dr. J. A. Best and Marion O'Harra. Out of 114 votes cast, Dr. Best received 72 and Mr. O'Harra 41. One ballot was blank. The other nominations are: For councilmen, M. A. Bryson, M. A. Baker and Charles Taylor; treasurer, Robert Kilgore; recorder, L. S. Wood. Another primary was also held, and a second ballot put out, the same as the other, excepting that Marion O'Harra is at the head for mayor.

The election was hotly contested to day, perhaps more so than any previous one in Weston's history.

### PENDLETON MEN BROUGHT HOME FIRST MONEY PRIZE.

Attended the La Grande Tournament and Won Out.

The shooters returned last night from La Grande, where they contested on Sunday with the local sportsmen for honors in a live bird and blue rock shoot. They report having had a pleasant time and were royally entertained by the La Grande sportsmen association.

In event No. 1, F. W. Waite and H. J. Stillman divided first money, which was \$50, between them, each killing five straight birds, and J. M. Spence was one of three to get third money of \$20.

The second shoot was at blue rocks. F. W. Waite and H. J. Stillman again carried off the \$50 first money, Murphy, of La Grande, was alone for second money, and J. M. Spence and S. R. Bolton won third. Spence and Bolton won first money in the third event, which was at live birds, killing seven birds each out of a possible seven. Stillman, Waite and Bolton got second; Murphy being alone for third.

## HELLO! MR. STOCK RAISER.

BUTTER CREEK TELEPHONE IS NOW INCORPORATED.

Articles Filed Saturday Evening—Names of the People Who Will Have 'Phones on the New Line.

Saturday evening articles of incorporation were filed with the county clerk, by A. B. Thompson, O. F. Thompson and J. B. Saylor, with a capital stock of \$600.

This line will run from Echo to the Sloan brothers' ranch, on Butter Creek, a distance of 25 to 30 miles, and will place about twenty farmers and business men in Echo and the county it passes through in direct communication with the outside world.

Sealed bids were advertised for some time ago for the construction of the line. These bids were opened at Echo Saturday. The contract was let to S. W. Wellenby and Clarence Biggs, whose bid was \$9.50 per mile for setting the poles and stringing the wire, the company to furnish the material and put it on the ground.

The line will cost the company something like \$1,200 in above the \$600, they have incorporated for, a bonus of \$250 has been raised and the rest that will be required for the construction of the line will be gotten through assessments from the stock. Those in Echo who have already subscribed for 'phones are: Charles Miller, store; Boyd & Darns, store; Dick Jones, livery stable; and those along the line who will have 'phones in their houses are: O. F. Thompson, R. N. Stanfield, J. B. Saylor, L. E. McBee, Jesse Moore, Mrs. L. C. Rogers, R. B. Stanfield, A. B. Thompson, Dr. C. J. Smith, W. H. Babb and A. J. Dillon. The company expect to push the work as fast as possible and will have the line completed ready for use in the early spring.
