They Own a Lot of Ground

PLACER CLAIMS ON THE NORTH FORK OF JOHN DAY.

One Company Has Control of Ten Miles of the River—Eastern Party Wants Property.

Ukiah, Dec. 2.—Work continues at the Oriental mines near this place. Several additional men were put on this week. The survey of the ditch is almost completed, and it is found to be a little over six miles in length.

The estimated cost of this ditch will be about \$7,000 per mile. The company will erect a saw mill in the early spring, at the head of the ditch, and are talking of fluming the entire distance. If this is done, it will require something over 1,000,000 feet of lumber. Anyhow, a considerable portion of it will have to be flumed.

They have bought the Kleinsorg property, which is near where the ditch will leave the river, and it is

understood that the deal is practically closed for the Clark & Pepper claims, which is between the two properties already purchased.

With these claims and others which they have located, the company will virtually own the river for a distance of ten miles. It is thought that the greater part of next season will be devoted to preliminary work, as it will be impossible to more than get ready to work on a large scale before another year.

Would Buy Isaacs Placers.

A party, said to be representing eastern capital, is at Dale now, looking over the Isaacs placer ground with a view of buying it. The opening up of the mines of the north fork of the John Day means much for Camas prairie. It means a market for produce, hay, grain, etc., work for all her idle men, and for the stores it means large sales of groceries, miners' clothing, etc.
