OFFICERS CHOSEN

CITY ELECTION CAUSED BUT LITTLE INTEREST.

No Opposition Excepting for Treasurer—Firemen Also Elect.

Never in the history of Pendleton has there been as little interest shown in the city election as was yesterday. There was no opposition for any of the offices except for treasurer, and consequently there was no need for any special effort being put forth. Only 162 votes were cast in all the wards for T. G. Halley for mayor, against 447 who had registered for the election, and nearly 1000 who should have been registered. This shows that the men who were nominated for the offices were satisfactory to the majority of the people and there was no need for the interest which would have otherwise been manifested. The names of the candidates and the number of votes each one received in the different wards are as follows:

T. G. Halley, mayor—First ward, 34; second ward, 55; third ward, 32; fourth ward, 41, making a total of 162 votes.

Charles Hamilton, for treasurer—First ward, 27; second ward, 32; third ward, 24; fourth ward, 31, total 124.

Hasbrouck, treasurer—First ward, 17; second ward, 22; third ward, 5; fourth ward, 16, or a total of 60 votes. This gives Mr. Hamilton a majority of 64.

E. J. Summerville, councilman for first ward, received 37 votes.

H. F. Johnson, councilman for second ward, 50 votes.

J. R. Dickson, councilman for third ward, 32 votes.

T. B. Wells, councilman fourth ward 41 votes.

It will be seen by the above that in almost every ward the same number of votes were cast for both mayor and councilmen, showing the unanimous sentiment of the people in favor of the men selected to run the municipal affairs of the city.

Fire Department Election.

The Pendleton fire department held their annual election at the city hall last evening. H. J. Stillman was re-elected chief and W. R. Withee was elected first assistant to succeed J. L. Sharon. Thomas McMahon succeeded Will Atchison as second assistant chief. There was no opposition for these offices with the exception of D. D. Phelps, who received a vote for first assistant.

Mrs. C. B. Wade went to Portland tonight on business connected with the state federation meeting and the Los Angeles bi-centennial of the general federation.

The meeting of the Thursday Afternoon Club that was to have been held at the home of Mrs. John Halley, Jr., on Thursday, December 5th, will be postponed one week owing to Mrs. Halley's illness.

Mrs. Turner Oliver came over from La Grande Monday to attend the reception of the Pendleton club women at the home of Mrs. C. J. Wade. Mr. Oliver is a member of the board of directors of the state federation.

Frank Richmond, of Hellix, was in Pendleton yesterday. Mr. Richmond says that he will not have to reseed any of his grain on account of the dry fall. He has 1000 acres of summer-fallow which he says is up and looking fine.

Mrs. S. A. Evans, secretary of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs, who has been a guest for two weeks at the home of Mrs. C. B. Wade, returns to Portland on tonight's train. Mrs. Evans is probably the best known club woman in Oregon, and is well called by her associates on the state board the "good right hand of the federation." Mrs. Evans has received many attentions from the club women during her stay in Pendleton.

Walla Walla Crop Prospects.

Alva Pierce, who lives eight miles this side of Walla Walla in Umatilla county, was in town today, returning home on this evening's W. & C. R. train. He says wheat in his section is looking splendidly, having been sown in the dust and nourished by the rains which came just at the right time. The prospects for next season's crop could not be better and conditions otherwise could not be improved.

Mixed Up 'Bus and Trees.

Yesterday morning the bus that gathers up children for St. Joseph's Academy, while on its regular route and near Charles Cunningham's place on Alta street, had an accident which caused it to be laid up for repairs for a day or two. In front of Mr. Cunningham's residence are some trees, and the driver got too close to them, catching the canvas top in a limb and tearing it off completely. No one was hurt.

No Lights.

Owing to a break down of the engine at the power house, Pendleton was in total darkness last night from about 8 o'clock in the evening to 4 in the morning. The break was not very serious, however, and the plant is again in running order.
