FORGER NOT FOUND

GEORGE E. ALLEN HAS
MADE A GOOD ESCAPE.

Spurious Check Man Disappeared and No Clew Is Known.
Word comes from Walla Walla that George E. Allen, who passed a forged check in that city Tuesday, had made his escape and that the officers had no clew to his whereabouts.
Tuesday Allen, a stranger appeared on the streets there and offered a check for \$38 to a number of business men for cashing, but he was turned down until in the evening when he went into A. Schwartz's saloon and cashed it for its full face value. The check was drawn on the Pendleton Savings Bank, supposedly to come from Gill Bros., stockmen of this county. After Allen was gone, Schwartz became suspicious of the genuineness of the paper, and the police were notified, but he had disappeared. The check arrived at the bank here yesterday and was pronounced a forgery and returned to the man who cashed it, who is out his cash, but is now a much wiser man. The same fellow is said to have passed several spurious checks in that city two years ago and made his escape. Nothing has been heard of him by the officers here.

HAD SEVERAL SEPARATIONS

MARRIED THREE TIMES
ASKED THREE DIVORCES.
Mrs. Mary E. Gillett Furnishes Unusual Record of Marrying and Separating.

Married to the same man three times and the same number of times to have applied for a divorce in five years, is the strange and romantic history of Mrs. Mary E. Gillett, who made application yesterday for divorce from her husband, Melvira H. Gillett. It is not often that a woman can boast of such a record as this.
Mrs. Gillett's maiden name was Mary Stranberry and she married Mr. Gillett something like eighteen years ago at the home of her parents near Pilot Rock. They lived together off and on for a while, but their happiness began to fade. One day she went home to her mother, saying that she would never live with her husband again. Soon she tired of single life and went back to the arms of her erstwhile husband. They were both of a jealous temperament, and soon dissension again arose and again she went home. They kept this up for thirteen years, when Mrs. Gillett applied for and secured her first legal separation from her husband. They lived separate for eighteen months, and again concluded that they were made for each other and were remarried. However, as before, their conjugal bliss did not last and the second divorce was applied for, but this time it was the husband who was the aggrieved one and the courts granted his petition for separation. That was about two years ago, and a year ago they were married the third time.
This time they stood marital life scarcely thirteen months. It is Mrs. Gillett on the boards again asking that the courts break the bonds existing between herself and M. H. Gillett. The case is the most unique in the history of Umatilla county.
Mr. and Mrs. Gillett are living on their farm six and a half miles southeast of Pendleton.

Robbed in his Own Office.

J. Lawton, a well-known painter and decorator, was nearly murdered in this city last evening, says a Dalles telegram. Mr. Lawton was out collecting accounts, and had accumulated considerable money. A man came into his office, near Third and Washington streets, and began talking to him, and in the midst of the conversation blew out the light and grabbed Lawton. A confederate running into the room assisted, and Lawton was overpowered and gagged and robbed of about \$50. Lawton's arms were tied behind him with a wire and were fastened to his ankles, and a big gag was placed over his mouth, which also covered his nose and almost smothered him. He was found nearly unconscious by Max Vogt, lying in his office and almost breathing his last, when rescued.
