EASTERN BUYER WANTS WALLA WALLA BARLEY.
Lot of 10,000 Sacks Bought by Harry Marsh at 70 Cents.
Walla Walla, Dec. 6.—Eastern buyers are after Washington barley, and an effort is being made to secure a number of carloads at once for shipment to Chicago. Harry Marsh, representing the Chicago Malting Company, is in the city today endeavoring to buy of W. P. Reser, the largest lot of barley in Walla Walla county, 10,000 sacks of exceptionally fine grain. Mr. Reser is the largest barley raiser in the county, and is trying to sell his crop at 70 cents per hundred net in the warehouse. At this time the price is a cent or two below that figure. Mr. Marsh wants barley for immediate shipment to Chicago. He wants only fine brewing quality, and is having difficulty in making farmers believe the market is in good condition to sell. It is likely that a shipment may be had at Dayton, but the prospects are not good for a movement from this city at present prices.

WHEAT REMAINS AT 47% WITH STABLE PROSPECTS.
Recent Advance Was Due to Local Speculation—No Further Rise Looked for by Pendleton Buyers.
The local wheat market remains the same as yesterday when it was quoted at 47½ cents per bushel. This may be the top of the market for the present, at least, according to local dealers, who say that there are no conditions in sight now that warrant the conclusion that the price will further advance, or even remain where it is. The recent advance was caused by local speculation, and it is thought that this will not hold good much longer.

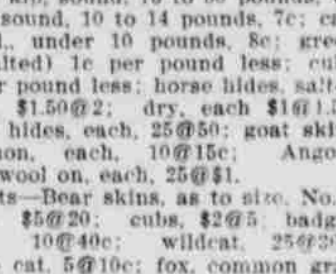
