THE SALARY MATTER

COUNCILMAN CLOPTON
 FATHERED REDUCTION

Gives Reason Why he Proposed Or-
 dinance Cutting Down Recorder's
 Salary from \$70 to \$25.

Since the publication of the pro-
 ceedings of the city council in Thurs-
 day's East Oregonian a great many
 have asked why it was that an ordi-
 nance was introduced cutting the
 salary of the city recorder from \$70
 to \$25.

Councilman F. B. Clopton was the
 father of this ordinance. When in-
 terviewed as to why it was drawn up
 and introduced, he said:

"It has been the general under-
 standing with the council that the re-
 corder's salary was too much for the
 work he was doing, and that the first
 of the year it would be cut down. This
 would have been done earlier, had the
 council had the power to do it, but
 the recorder was elected to serve at
 a stated salary and we could not cut
 it down until the year was out. Early
 last spring, a water commission was
 appointed and they took the work
 which heretofore had been on the
 shoulders of the recorder. Before
 then the recorder had to act as su-
 perintendent, collect the rents, and
 keep the books. The work was worth
 \$70 until this was taken out of his
 hands, and now all that he has to do is
 to act as clerk of the council and
 issue city licenses. This ought not
 to occupy more than five days of his
 time during the whole month, and we
 think that \$25 is enough for the work
 he will have to perform. If the pre-
 sent recorder does not wish to serve
 for the salary indicated in the ordi-
 nance, a man can be found that will
 be glad to do so. This move was
 made simply as a matter of economy,
 and will be a saving to the city of
 \$50 a year."

BETTER HOUSE OF WORSHIP

IMPROVEMENT TO BE
 MADE IN BAPTIST CHURCH

About \$1200 to be Expended Begin-
 ning Next March.

The Baptist church people have
 plans drawn and are making arrange-
 ments for the improvement of their
 church. The front will be torn out,
 and facing Alta street, a large fancy
 window will be placed. A "T" will
 be built on the west side, extending
 out to Johnson street, with a tower
 and entrance in the corner. On the
 east a nine foot projection will be
 built for the pulpit, baptistry and
 choir. The seats will be turned
 around to face the east in a circle
 and a furnace will be put beneath to
 heat the house. This remodeling will
 cost about \$1200 and when finished
 they will have just the same as a new
 house of worship. The work will com-
 mence about the first of March.
