For Catholic Federation.

Cincinnati, O., Dec. 9.—Representative Catholic clergy and laymen from all parts of the country are arriving in Cincinnati for the big Catholic convention to begin its session here to-morrow. The main purpose of the gathering is to complete the organization of the American Federation of Catholic Societies of the United States. Among those already here is Bishop McFaul, of New Jersey, who originated the movement for federation, and who will probably be chosen first president of the new organiza- tion.

Interstate Commerce Cases.

Washington, Dec. 9.—After a recess of several weeks, the interstate commerce commission resumed its sittings here today. The cases docketed for early consideration include those of the National Hay Association against the Lake Shore & Michigan Southern Railroad and of the Business Men's League of St. Louis, against the Atchison and numerous other roads. The issues are practically the same in both cases, namely, alleged discrimina- tion in rates.

Another Six-Day Race.

Rochester, N. Y., Dec. 9.—A six-day go-as-you-please race began here to-day under the management of William Noagland, the former champion heel-and-toe walker. The men will race 12 hours each day, as the state law forbids a continuous contest. The contestants include a number of well-known pedestrians.

Supreme Court's Recess.

Washington, Dec. 9.—When the supreme court adjourned today it was for a four-weeks' recess. When it reconvenes in January the court will occupy its own rooms, vacating the quarters of the senate committee on judiciary, which have been used by the court pending repairs on its own rooms.

J. KELLEY, AGED 84 YEARS

DEATH OF A PIONEER OCCURRED ON SATURDAY.

Had Been Sick for Two Years With Cancer—Funeral on Sunday.

J. Kelley, a pioneer of this country, who is well known and stood high in the community, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. B. F. McElroy, four miles east of here near the agency, Saturday afternoon, at the age of 84 years, three months and 17 days. Mr. Kelley has been a sufferer from cancer on the hand and was under the care of a nurse for the past two years. While his death had been expected for some time, it comes as a shock to his wife and daughter as well as his many warm friends.

The funeral services were conducted at the house Sunday at 11 o'clock by Rev. G. W. Bigby, and the remains were laid in their last resting place in the Olney cemetery in this city about 1 o'clock in the afternoon.

FOLSOM TALLMAN'S PONY HAS BEEN SHIPPED TO HIM.

He Guessed Within Four Ounces of the Weight of the Ten Shetlands.

Arthur Folsom Tallman, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. V. Tallman who was lucky in winning one of the ten ponies given away by the Wayne Knitting Mills, of Fort Wayne, Ind., only missed the weight of the ten ponies combined by four ounces. His is the only one that comes to the west except one that goes into Montana, and Master Arthur Folsom is feeling very good over his good fortune. He now has one pony and this one will make him a team. Out of the ten closest guesses, the farthest away was six ounces and the closest was two ounces. The pony has been shipped from Fort Wayne, and will be here now almost any day.
