WHEAT SOLD AT HALF DOLLAR
LATE SATURDAY AFTERNOON.

About 125,000 Bushels Went From Grower to Buyer—Farmers Think the 55-Cent Mark Will Soon be Reached and Are Refusing to Consider the Present Offers—Rise Due to Speculation on the Coast.

Probably 125,000 bushels of wheat was disposed of by the farmers of Umatilla county after 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Between 3 and 4 the local price began to jump, and at 4 it had reached the 50-cent mark. Many farmers who had been holding for this figure let go their crops, with the result that \$62,500 was thrown into circulation in less than two hours. Had this price been quoted earlier in the day, more would have been sold.

This bulge in the local market was caused by speculation on the part of coast dealers. Actual conditions of the world's market does not warrant this price, but the movement has been started and continues strong this morning, with indications that prices may go still higher.

Some of the farmers, who were holding for the present quoted price, have come to the conclusion that it will reach 55 cents soon, and are now holding for that figure.

It is thought that there will not be much more movement for a few days, unless it goes above 50 cents.

COMBINE IDEA APPLIED TO THE REAL ESTATE BUSINESS.

Dealers in Dirt Adopt the Current Centralizing Tactics of the Big Railway Magnates—E. T. Wade Will Be the Local Representative.

The real estate men of the country will obtain the business advantages to be derived from the principle of combination. The Inter-Mountain-Pacific Investment Association has been organized, with Andrew L. Meutz as manager and special correspondent, and Seattle, Wash., as his place of headquarters. E. T. Wade has been appointed local representative in Pendleton.

The idea is somewhat unique, and it is believed it will bring many advantages to the dealers in dirt who affiliate with it.

Mr. Meutz was in Pendleton on Sunday, and explained to the East Oregonian the purposes and aims of the new organization. He said:

"We have placed agencies in many towns in most of the coast states, although we have not begun to work in Oregon. Our plan is to maintain a central office, through which is to flow information as to the demand for realty, and the manner in which best to dispose of it. We shall transmit to our representatives lists of new members joining from time to time, and keep them in touch with the changes taking place in the general aspects of the business.

"This plan will appeal strongly to all who appreciate the business benefits coming to those who have lately affected such vast combines upon Wall street in the railway and industrial world. It will place our clients in position to be first in line for word of coming investors, and will enable them properly to prepare to receive them and meet their wants."

Demands is Good.
 E. T. Wade, who occupies an office in the East Oregonian building, stated to this paper that the present demand for realty is exceedingly good. All sorts of property is asked for, and prices are obtainable at fair valuations.
