It is reported that 300 Bowers intend to establish in Chile.

The Douglasville, Ga., bank was robbed of \$2,500. The robbers escaped on a handcar.

The loss by burning of the National Search Works, at Des Moines, is placed at \$400,000.

The czar has conveyed an intimation of his willingness to receive King Alexander and Queen Traza of Serbia.

In a fire at Bayu des Allemandes, La. Miss May Ernest, aged 17, and Phoebe Delbrun, aged 2, were burned to death.

Sixty-five persons were poisoned at a wedding feast at West Point, Wis., by poison in the coffee. All will probably recover.

An anti-doping league was formed at Vienna by members of the Reichsrath, high officials and other notable personages.

Thousands of the starving unemployed are rioting daily at Prague, and strong forces of police are keeping order there.

Judge Newberger, at New York, denied the motion to dismiss the indictment against Roland B. Molineux, for the murder of Miss Catherine Adams.

Allen C. Fuller, a millionaire, and who was adjutant general of Illinois troops during the civil war, died at his home at Baltimore, Ill., aged 75 years.

A. H. Muller, who was arrested at Philadelphia for uttering a remark to the effect that President Roosevelt should be shot, was released from custody.

General Denning's column from Jandala India, has been raiding the Mahand villages in Waziristan, and has had ten men killed and sixteen wounded.

Night Marshal J. B. Smith, at Chelsea, Ia., was shot and killed by three robbers, who were attempting to break into the bank. The robbers made their escape.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS

The Carbon County, Wyoming, Woodgrowers' Association has closed a contract with the Union Pacific for the use of 480,000 acres of railroad land in the Red Desert for next year.

Newberg's new axle-handle factory started up full blast the first of the week and is now doing business with a rush and whirr. It is equipped with up-to-date machinery and can turn out between 150 and 200 handles in a day.

Jury men were secured to act as jurors in the case of William Dalton, one of the murderers of James B. Morrow, and the trial of the case was taken up at the state circuit court in Portland Monday, being heard by Judge Cleland, assisted by Judge Sears.

The subscription committee of the Portland Library, composed of W. M. Ladd, Dr. T. L. Elliot, Milton W. Smith and W. L. Brewster, will begin work right away, to raise the fund of \$10,000 necessary to enable the citizens of Portland to have free access to the 35,000 books now reserved to members of the Library Association.

The funeral of Maurice Cavanaugh, the engineer of the O. R. & N. company, who was killed in the murderous train wreck a few days ago, was held Sunday in Portland from the Church of the Immaculate Heart, Williams avenue. A large number of friends paid tribute to the dead engineer. Interment was in Mount Calvary cemetery.

Several hundred horses have been bought in Burns lately for the British government, to be shipped to South Africa. The horses are small, weighing from 700 to 950 pounds, and the price paid per head ranges from \$25 to \$35. This is the first time that a buyer for the English government has gone to that county to buy horses.

THE STRANGE THEOLOGIAN

THIS MAN SAW INSANE PREACHER CHENOWETH.

He Was Desirous of Reaching California or British Columbia and to Leave Oregon.

H. Baumgardner, who was in Pendleton during Monday from his home near Echo, stated to the East Oregonian that he saw and talked with the notorious crazy preacher, Elwood Chenoweth, the next day after he escaped from the Union county sheriff by jumping from the window of a moving train near Nolia. He told Mr. Baumgardner that he had just escaped from the officer and that he wanted to get to California or British Columbia before he was caught again. He had already cost the state of Oregon \$500 and he did not want to be of any more cost to the state. If he could get to either of the above-named places he would be satisfied and would not once if he was again sent to the insane asylum. He claimed to have served in the asylum at Salem and also in California, and did not hesitate to tell it.

Chenoweth has not been heard of since he escaped from the constable at Ukiah a few days after this, and his whereabouts is still a mystery.

STATEMENT OF J. N. WILLIAMSON'S POSITION.

Prineville Politician Adopts a Policy of Obviating Friction—His Candidacy to be Determined Later.

Mr. Scriber says that J. N. Williamson, of Prineville, is everywhere spoken of as one of the coming sintermen of Oregon. He has withdrawn his candidacy for the position of secretary of state. To have continued in the race might have caused a great deal of friction, and Williamson is not that kind of a politician. The people of his own and neighboring counties insist upon his becoming a candidate for congress and he may consent. But he is not an enemy of Mr. Moody and will not oppose him if he lead there is evidence of decided weakness in his campaign. Mr. Williamson is a man of the people and can afford to hide his time.—La Grande Chronicle.
