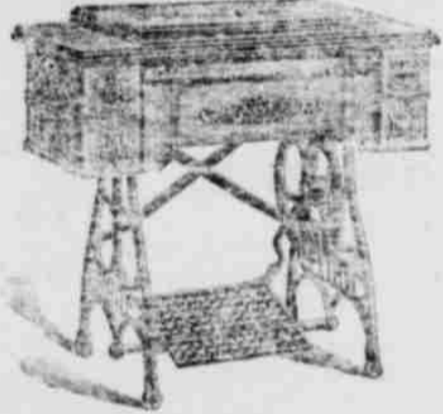

**T. A. LIEUALLEN IS  
 NOW MAYOR OF ADAMS**

Election Held on Monday—He Received  
 32 out of 58 Votes.

Adams, Dec. 19.—Thomas A. Lieual-  
 len was elected mayor of Adams in  
 the election held here on Monday. M.  
 A. Ferguson was chosen recorder; J.  
 E. Cherry, treasurer; and the coun-  
 cillmen are: Dick Powers, J. K. John-  
 son, B. L. Simpson, Albert Harala  
 and William Holdman.

Mr. Lieuallen received 32 out of 58  
 that were cast, his opponent being  
 Dr. J. C. Smith.

The election was not fought on any  
 particular issue, although the question  
 of the location of the saloons was an  
 element in the contest. It was not  
 stated exactly what the effect of the  
 election of Mr. Lieuallen will have  
 upon this issue.

**COMING THICK AND FAST**

BAKER CITY HERALD  
 SAYS SOMETHING'S WRONG

Alleges Citizens in Baker County  
 Have Been Defrauded and Asks  
 Where Rests Responsibility.

The Baker City Herald says:  
 "Developments in the alleged giant-  
 tic lieu school land fraud and  
 swindle are coming thick and fast.  
 The latest public feature in Baker  
 City is the arrival on the scene of W.  
 H. Odell of Salem. Mr. Odell was the  
 secretary of the former state school  
 land board, under the administration  
 of Governor William P. Lord. As such  
 he acquired a great deal of informa-  
 tion about the location and value of  
 the school land of the state. Since  
 then Mr. Odell has been interested in  
 lieu lands. He made no secret of the  
 fact that his visit was in the interest  
 of present or future clients and that  
 he desired to ascertain the location of  
 valuable school lands, and also to  
 feel of the public pulse in Baker coun-  
 ty regarding this matter.

Briefly, the situation is this:  
 When valuable school lands are de-  
 clared to be mineral lands, they re-  
 vert to the general government and  
 the government must pay the state  
 for them or give in return lieu lands.  
 The knowledge of the location of val-  
 uable lieu lands is worth a large sum  
 of money to the possessor of this in-  
 formation, whether he be a lawyer or  
 someone else. Hence the big busi-  
 ness being done in lieu lands. It is  
 evident that Mr. Odell is looking for  
 that particular knowledge and that by  
 virtue of his former official position  
 already possesses a great deal of it.  
 Mr. Odell stated last night that he  
 could not see why any citizen of Ba-  
 ker county should feel aggrieved, as  
 when lands revert to the government,

the United States must pay the state  
 for them or give up lands in lieu.

"The fact is ignored that citation  
 notices are published in obscure pa-  
 pers and seldom are read by the ac-  
 tual settlers who lose valuable im-  
 provements through this alleged  
 fraudulent system. It may be that  
 the laws are defective and if so the  
 only course left to pursue is to keep a  
 diligent watch on all land grafters,  
 both of high and low degree, until  
 these faulty laws can be remedied by  
 legislation. The fact remains that  
 Baker county citizens are being de-  
 frauded in the lieu land swindle and  
 some one should be made responsi-  
 ble."
