## PAVING QUESTION

### BUSINESS MEN SPEAK CONCERNING THE STREETS.

Various Opinions of Citizens as to the Issue That is Now Before the People.

Many of the business men of Pendleton were interviewed yesterday evening on the subject uppermost in the minds of most of them—i. e., doing something to rid the streets of the mud which is an abomination to every man, woman and child who has to travel them. With one accord, they say something must be done, but what this something will be, for the advantage to the city, and the least cost, is the question which is agitating the minds of all. Following is the expression made by some men seen:

E. M. Lyons.

E. M. Lyons—"Six inches of crushed rock ought to be put on Main and Court streets in the business portion of the town. I will gladly pay my proportion of the taxes for this."

G. A. Hartman.

G. A. Hartman—"The only thing I know to do is to put on a coat of crushed rock."

J. M. Bentley.

J. M. Bentley—"To put on crushed rock or pave would not do away with the mud, unless the dirt and dust carried in during the summer was swept off before the rainy season commenced. Most of this mud is carried in here on wagon wheels and horses' feet from the country and outside of town."

E. D. Boyd.

E. D. Boyd—"I am not in favor of crushed rock, for I do not think it will be the benefit some think. The gravel put on the streets some time ago is a detriment to them, as the mud was not so bad before. I got muddy then, but the water could soak into the ground and it soon dried up. Now it stands on top and cannot soak in. I think the efficiency of crushed rock should be thoroughly tested before any expense is gone to by the city experimenting."

R. A. Alexander.

R. A. Alexander—"I think something should be done. The present condition of the streets is a disgrace, and I will be too glad to pay my share of the taxes for any improvement that will prove lasting."

J. V. Tallman.

J. V. Tallman—"It is a shame the way our streets are. The time has come when something must be done."

J. E. Krause.

J. E. Krause—"This city ought to do as they do in small towns in the old country. Set a side a certain portion of the taxes for street paving and establish a fund for this purpose, then each year as there is money in this fund expend it for paving as far as it will go. In a few years considerable street can be paved in this way."

Lee Teutsch.

Lee Teutsch—"Whatever is done should be permanent. If it costs the property a little more while it is being done, that should not be considered, if it will be the best in the long run. A committee should be appointed at the expense of the city to investigate and see what would prove the most effective for the longest time. The streets really look worse to the outsider than they are."

Only Local Shooters Are to Compete—Seven Birds to the Man, \$5 Entrance.

They say that the failure yesterday does not mean that the idea will be abandoned entirely, but owing to the rush preparing for the holiday trade and the extra work that those in charge of arrangements had on hand the market day was neglected and allowed to pass yesterday with little attention. But it is not the intention of the association to let the matter go by default. They will let the matter rest for a month or two, and then in the spring take it up again, with a better organized system and carry the idea to a complete success.

### THREATENED WIFE'S LIFE.

Catherine Murray Asks the Court for Legal Separation.

Catherine Murray has sued for divorce from her husband, William Murray, alleging that for the past seven years he has made life burdensome for her by choking and otherwise abusing her and that many times she has been driven from their home on the reservation when her husband, intoxicated, threatened to take her life. There are no children. She prays that the court award her half of all the property owned by them.
