KNIGHTS TEMPLAR

DISTINGUISHED MASONS INSTITUTE COMMANDERY

Pendleton Organization will hereafter
Work Under Charter instead of a
Dispensation.

At Masonic Temple in this city yesterday evening, W. T. Wright, of Union, grand eminent commander of the Oregon Grand Commandery, Knights Templar, assisted by Sir Knights E. W. Davis, of Union; H. H. Kiddell, of Island City; John Maineson, of La Grande; Dr. Loomis, of Eugene; Dr. Jessup, of Salem; C. J. Freese, of Walla Walla, and A. F. Nash, of this city, formally instituted the Pendleton commandery and established a permanent charter under which the Masonic order of Pendleton will work in the future, instead of under a dispensation, as heretofore.

They say that the little Indians take a great pride in keeping themselves and the house neat, and that no white school in the country will rank above them in cleanliness. There are over 100 students in the school with ages ranging from 5 to 17.

A Wreck at Bonneville.
A wreck occurred on the O. R. & N. company's road near Bonneville Wednesday morning, that delayed the passenger train for over two hours. One freight car belonging to a west-bound train jumped the track, from what cause could not be learned. Nobody was hurt, and it is believed the damage was not serious.
