GENERAL NEWS

Confidential negotiations are imminent between Great Britain and Holland which may result in bringing poor women and children to Holland.

The followers of General Bartolomeo Masso, democratic candidate for the presidency, are conducting an energetic campaign in Porto Principe province.

The state department has been obliged to decline to be drawn into a discussion of the various projects for general arbitration now pending before the Congress of American Republics at the City of Mexico.

General Leonard A. Wood, governor of Cuba, was asked: "Is reciprocity for Cuba assured?" "Well not exactly assured," he replied, "but I believe it will come in the near future and it is only fair and just."

The president decided to reappoint the following United States Judges: Arizona, associate justices, George R. Davis, Fletcher M. Doan, Richard E. Sloan; New Mexico, chief justice, W. J. Mills; associate, John R. McPhe and Frank W. Parker; Oklahoma, chief justice, John H. Burford; associate, Bayard T. Hainer and B. H. Burwell.

The protocol signed by the United States Minister, Merry and Dr. Fernando Canchez, the Nicaraguan secretary of foreign affairs, grants the United States three miles on each side of the proposed canal, the meridian line being the center of the waterway. Nicaragua will have full sovereignty over the canal route, but the United States will have control over it.

The Pan-American conference, in which the United States delegate outlined the relative interests at stake of the United States and the Latin republics, the committee unanimously adopted a resolution recommending that in the selection of a board of judges each republic name three, from whom one to five would be chosen for each particular trial, according to its importance, each American republic to nominate at least one Anglo-Saxon judge.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS

The number of hold-ups in and about Oregon City during the past week has been alarming. It is believed all have been the work of the same man.

The new home of the Salem Young Men's Christian Association was formally opened Wednesday evening at a public meeting held in the auditorium of the Y. M. C. A. building.

It is reported from Neah Bay that wreckage with the name Matteawan on pieces of it has washed ashore 14 miles south of Cape Flattery. The find was made about a week ago by natives.

The tug Tyce passed by Port Angeles about 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, having in tow the bark Pinnore which, it was believed, had foundered. The bark was found anchored off Gray's Harbor, in 18 fathoms of water.

At Oregon City Sheriff Cooke, by authority of the county court, has offered a reward of \$100 for the arrest and conviction of the party or parties who are participating in the hold-ups and highway robbery in the vicinity of Oswego and Milwaukie within the boundary of Clackamas county.

A sensation was caused in the circuit court at Baker City when the attorneys for Alex Meldrum, who is on trial for horse stealing, having been indicted jointly with Manny Howard, last spring, objected to the special venire of the jury summoned by the sheriff on the ground that they had been selected at the instance of the Stockmen's Association.

Attorney-General Blackburn on the question: "In case a school is dismissed by order of the district board in consequence of an epidemic of any disease in the district, is the teacher entitled to pay for the time school was closed?" holds that a teacher is entitled to his salary under such conditions, unless a provision to the contrary be stipulated in the contract.

UTAH BUYERS STIFFEN LOCAL WHEAT MARKET.

Situation Quiet, But Looked at by Buyers as Hopeful of Better Conditions in Near Future—A Chicago Opinion.

Presence here of buyers from Utah to obtain grain to supply millers' demands in that state, has acted as a stimulant upon the local market, so that the situation, although just now quiet, is promising. This is what local people think who are interested in the grains. The absence of public advice, from Liverpool, compelled operators to go slowly in all parts of the country. Most of them look for movement soon, both here and at larger centers. Considerable of wheat has been bought for the Utah mills through Pendleton buyers. It is shipped under the special tariff recently issued by the O. R. & N. and Short Line to accommodate the millers of that state.

Eggs are now worth 35 cents in trade in Pendleton, and are hard to get at that price. Hen fruit rapidly approaches the point at which it will be worth its weight in gold.

Butter is up to 60 cents for creamery, and little comes from the private dairymen.

The Recent Bulge.

Chicago, Dec. 12.—The Record-Herald thus treats the recent wheat excitement:

It was a wonderful week with the wheat speculators, a great advance—a huge trade and the development entirely a popular one. Such excitement is rare. The impulse of this movement was given months ago when the drought on the corn crop in two, reduced the yield of oats and made vegetables and fruits scarce and dear. The popular view was then taken that comparative scarcity of the food stuffs generally, and of most edibles would affect the price of wheat, although there was a generous supply of it. The situation has worked out as the public expected. There is the technical reason for a further advance. Broad public bull movements without manipulation usually have long runs. Outside holders come in with ample margins and are not changed in mood quickly.
