FOOTBALL SPORT

PENDLETON PLAYS TWO GAMES LA GRANDE AND WALLA WALLA

Both High School and Academy will Go Against Outside Teams on Their Grounds—Each School in Best Form Yet.

On Saturday next the Pendleton High School plays against the La Grande High school, and on the same day, the Pendleton Academy goes against the Walla Walla High school. Both teams go in the best form yet attained during the present season, and with sufficient of practice and previous experience in games played to warrant their friends in expecting them to put up the very best article of football they are able under the circumstances. The lineups will be practically the same as in the game here last Saturday, that of the academy being:

Proome, right end; Cargill, right tackle; Halley, right guard; Shick, center; Hambill, left guard; Kennedy, left tackle; Strand, left end; Sullivan, right half; Slusher, left half; Penland, quarter back; Capt. Hill, full back.

High school: Wyrick, left end; Baker, left tackle; Hartman, left guard; Arnsperger, center; Taylor, right guard; Williams, right tackle; Millarkey, right end; Gard, left half; McCarty, right half; Capt. Wyrick, quarter; Cronin, full back. Substitutes, High school, Nell, Downey and Wells. Academy, Roesch and Hoskins.

The academy will go over Saturday morning and return Sunday afternoon. The High school will go Saturday morning and return Sunday night or Monday morning.

Walla Walla is Preparing.

The Union speaks of the coming game:

With signal practice and light team work the high school team is getting into shape for the game Saturday, when it will meet the Pendleton academy on the gridiron in this city. That the game will be close and hard there is no room for doubt, but Manager Gilbraith and Captain Delaney are hopeful and willing and the battle will be fought to the last ditch.

A good portion of the present week will be spent in getting into shape for the defensive work of the contest. Much time is being devoted to special instruction and Capt. Delaney has his men in closet every evening explaining the intricate elements of the combined tackle and guards' defense plan which has been adopted by the high school team.

"Prize-Pickers vs. "Sheep-Header."

Walla Walla, Dec. 13.—The Pendleton Academy and the city high school football teams will play the final game of the season at this place tomorrow, and a lively game is anticipated. The high school boys are an active lot of fellows, well trained, and they are confident of success. On the other hand, it is said that the sheepheaders are coming confident of winning easily, and will put up the best ball of their lives. A large attendance is anticipated.

Whitman to Have a Field.

To fit up a track fence an athletic field and erect bleachers east of Billings hall, and to lay off the grounds so as to best display its natural advantages and enhance its beauty is the plan upon which the trustees as well as the students of Whitman college are working at the present time.

The exact cost of the work has not been ascertained, but it is known that from \$1200 to \$1500 will be expended in putting the grounds in shape for track meets, outdoor basket ball games, foot races and kindred sports. No provision will be made for bicycle races, and it is understood that in future they will not form a part of athletic exhibitions in the northwest college league.

One-fifth of a mile will be the length of the track when fitted up and completed. The home stretch has been broadened and straightened to form a perfect speedway for the 100 yard events and in the interior of the oval will be measuring poles and chalked grounds for long distance jumping and hammer throwing as well as the shot put.

Inter-Mountain League.

Salt Lake, Dec. 13.—Representatives of the Inter-Mountain Baseball League to include Salt Lake, Ogden, Helena, Butte, Great Falls, Pocatello and Boise, are in session here. Preliminaries will be arranged and the schedule formulated so soon as the railroad rates are settled for the season from April 29 to October 1.

JUBILEE CELEBRATION TO HEAD CONSUL FALKENBURG.
