Signals From Wrecked Vessels.
A kite for signalling from a wrecked
vessel, and also to be used as a
means of sending a line ashore, has
been invented by Captain Brossard de
Corbigny, of the French naval reserve.
It is collapsible and readily packed
when not needed for use. When flown
in the air it can be deflected at an
angle of 45 degrees from the direction
of the wind. By this means a line
may be flown over almost any desired
spot. The line is dropped by sending
aloft a little cutting device, which
travels along the cord and is put into
operation automatically when it
touches the kite.

MAYOR-ELECT HAILEY TALKS
ABOUT THE ATHENA STREETS.

He Finds That Crushed Rocks Has
Been a Good Thing—Advises Pen-
dleton to Investigate.
Mayor-elect T. G. Hasley returned
yesterday evening from Athena where
he inspected the Main street of that
town, which was treated to a layer
of crushed rocks last summer. Before
this was done, for months at a time
during the rainy season wagons would
drive to the fannies in the mud on Main
street, and it was no unusual sight
to see wagons and teams stuck in the
mud and the drivers unable to get
them out until unloading his rig. The
enterprising people of this little burg
held a mass meeting and came to the
conclusion that this condition of af-
fairs was a great drawback to the
growth and upbuilding of the place,
and raised such a row that the city
purchased a rock crusher and last
summer put on a six-inch coat of
crushed rock. When asked what he
thought of a similar plan to the one
adopted in Athena being tried here,
Mr. Hasley said:
"Well, I inspected the streets as
thoroughly as possible for the time
I was there, and talked to many busi-
ness men as to what they thought
about it. All were well pleased with
the experiment and said it had helped
them out wonderfully. Although there
is some little mud in the center of
the street that has been carried in
on wagon wheels, horses' hoofs, etc.,
traffic is good compared with what it
was before this was done, and several
that I talked with said this condition
could be partly eradicated by making
the streets a little more oval in shape
so that the water and slush would run
off. I found that the cost of placing
this layer of rock on the street was
only about 70 cents per lineal foot for
the property-holder, reaching out to
the middle of the street."

The Cost.
To count the cost of the rock
crusher in with this, the whole would
run up to about 90 cents. This is
very moderate, and I think the same
method could be used here to great
advantage. However, I would suggest
that if such improvement for the
streets of Pendleton is contemplated,
that it not be done without due delib-
eration and that the different kinds of
street paving methods calculated to
improve streets and rid them of mud
be investigated and it be determined
what would prove the most beneficial
in the long run. If the property-hold-
ers along Main and Court streets of
Pendleton could get streets that
would only last for a few years, they
would better pay \$1.50, or even more,
if necessary, to get streets that will
be permanent and last for many ears.
I am in favor of something being done
to get rid of this mud, but am not in
favor of making any definite steps
until we know what we are doing and
what will be the best for the longest
time."
