HORSES GO TO THE SOUTH AFRICAN WAR.
Ten Cars Shipped From Here Today Over the O. R. & N. Lines.
Hereford & Lowther, who are buying horses for the British government, shipped 10 cars of horses from here over the O. R. & N. this morning to go to Lathrop, Mo., for thorough inspection before being sent to South Africa for use in the invasion against the Boers. All of these horses were not purchased in this neighborhood, but some came from Walla Walla, Waitsburg, Colfax and other Washington towns, and were shipped from here as a central point from which to make up the whole carloads. It is expected that several more carloads of horses will go from here for the same destination soon.

Richie a Deputy.
J. S. Richie, of Milton, has been appointed by Sheriff William Blakely to act as deputy sheriff of Milton and adjoining territory for a few months. This was made necessary by the extra work connected with the levying and foreclosing on property for delinquent tax for the year 1900, and Mr. Richie will have charge of this special work in Milton and surrounding territory.

New Rubber Maker.
A ten million dollar company has been organized at Trenton for the purpose of engaging in the business of making rubber shoes with the machine recently patented by Joseph Oliver Stokes. The entire operation is done by the machine, and the shoe is said to be turned out in a manner superior to those made by hand. The finish on the outside surface is so fine that it is not necessary to put the piece through the varnishing process, heretofore essential.

URGES THIS PLAN

C. A. BARRETT TELLS ABOUT HOW ATHENA MADE STREETS.

He Was Chairman of the Street Committee—Had Personal Charge of the Work—Says Pendleton Can Treat With Crushed Rock for From 75 to 85 Cents per Front Foot—Advices Pendleton to Follow Athena's Example.

Answering your letter of inquiry, concerning the improvement of Main street, Athena, with crushed rock I will say that the improvement has proved highly satisfactory. In my estimation, no other way of improving streets in this kind of soil will give as good satisfaction for the money expended. Our streets are standing the wear finely. Where one year ago the mud was hub deep, the surface of the street is now hard and smooth. Such traffic as heavy drayloads and steam engines does not make any impression.

The first thing to do is to put your streets on an even grade and prepare for good drainage. Make the street very crowning to the center to shed water. Surface this with crushed rock six or eight inches deep. Pack the crushed rock down with a heavy roller. Spread over the surface a thin layer of clay. Then roll again with a heavy roller.

You will then have a street that is so smooth and hard that heavy drays or horses shoe-calks will scarcely make a mark. This kind of street will shed water and stand for years, and it can be done at such cost that property-owners can afford it. This you ought to get done for not to exceed \$1 per front foot, counting frontage to the center of the street.

City to Own Crusher.

If the city will buy its own rock crusher and tools, and equip the same with an elevator and screen and put a competent superintendent in charge under the supervision of the street committee, the city can do this work for the property-owners for 75 to 85 cents per front foot. By the city doing its own work it insures the best results, keeps the money expended at home, and gives the property-owners the most value for their money.

The city of Athena had offers from contractors to do the grading and graveling with crushed rock for three blocks on Main street at \$1.25 per front foot. The council did not accept the offer, but instead gave the street committee full charge, and the work was done by the city under the supervision of the street committee, of which the writer was chairman, with the following results:

Athena's Figures.

Average cost of grading the three blocks, about 9 cents per front foot.
Surfacing street with six inches of crushed rock, 62 1/2 cents per front foot.

Surfacing crushed rock with thin layer of clay to assist the packing, 2 1/2 cents per front foot.

Total, 74 cents per front foot, or a saving to the property-owners of 51 cents per front foot.

The total frontage treated with crushed rock was something over 4000 front feet.

The saving to property-owners on these streets by the city doing its own work is more than \$2000.

We averaged the cost of crushed rock and charged each property-owner the same per front foot, based on an 80-foot street.

The grading was charged to each block, the actual amount expended on each block.

Not having any heavy roller to roll the crushed rock, we had to depend on the natural wear and travel to pack the street after being treated.

Good for Pendleton.

OUR STREETS SO TREATED ARE NOW IN FINE CONDITION, AND WHERE USED THE MOST, ARE THE BEST AND SMOOTHEST.

Because of the character of the soil and ease of access to the rock, Pendleton would be an ideal place to improve streets with crushed rock, and, in my estimation, this improvement once started and rightly handled by the city, the improvement would give such satisfaction that each and every part of your city would petition for such improvement.

In conclusion, permit me to say that our streets are so satisfactory, com-

pared with what they were before the improvements were made, that all are satisfied and the verdict is: "This money well expended."

This letter is already too long, and to enter into details would take too much space. I would be pleased to give you more particulars at some other time. My advice to Pendleton is, improve your streets with crushed rock and the sooner you go about it the better.
