COFFIN BROTHERS. Some Talk Vitrified Brick.

Here in Pendleton, since the question has been agitated during the past feed yard where they are now for sevfew days, there has been heard some talk of using vitrified brick. Figures will be at hand in a short time, so that the citizens of the town may know something about what that kind of street costs. It is claimed by many that the street made of vitrified brick is permanent as any, and that one advantage is that brick may be at any time taken up, for instance, for the laying of sewers, or other things requiring that the streets be torn up. Several towns are known of that have used the vitrified brick, and the general opinion seems to be that they \$2.20 per 100. make an excellent sort of highway.

Asphalt not Spoken of. No one has mentioned asphalt, excepting Councilman Clopton, who in a recent interview stated that the cost of that kind of pavement would be beyond the reach of this place. City Would Build Crossings.


