ANKENY TELLS EASTERN

OREGON TO GET IN

And Drill for Recognition by the State Conventions-Some Comment on Candidates From Hereabouts.

While in Baker City, Levi Ankeny, president of the First National Bank of Pendleton, said:

It is time for the people of Eastern Oregon to claim their birthrights. They can only do so when they organize and demand their rights in a solid body. Instead of the separate combinations seeking recognition separately, they should unite upon their man, and give him the entire support of Eastern Oregon." When asked When asked what he thought about the prospects of Henry Ankeny, his brother, of Southern Oregon, as a candidate for governor, against Governor Geer, Mr. Ankeny replied that he, of course, favored his brother, not only because Henry was a near relative, but because he was a good man for the

Williamson's Statement.

J. N. Williamson, of Princville, said to the Portland Oregonian: The unsettled condition of the political situation in Eastern Oregon, and in fact, in the entire state, makes it impossible for me to make a definite announcement of any candidacy at present. My friends know that it has been my desire to go before the state convention as a candidate for secretary of state. I have had no intention of flirting with two nominations, but circumstances may so shape themselves that I may be compelled to forego my ambition. Regarding my cossible candidacy for congress, I shall be governed more or less by con-ditions, as is every man in public life.

It is early yet to discuss nominations to be made next summer." The Oregonian's Comment.

While it will be seen by the state' ment that Mr. Williamson denies flatly that he is a miscellaneous candidate for whatever office may drop his way, yet he is not now ready to announce just where he will be in the scramble for political honors.

A politician, familiar with the sitnation, said yesterday that It was more than likely that Mr. Williamson would allow the secretary of state nomination to go by without a contest from him, and that he would declare himself a candidate for the congressional nomination. A political feud has long existed between certain republicans and Congressman Moody and the former are urging Williamson to make the fight against Moody.

Personally Mr. Williamson admits that he would prefer to be nominated for secretary of state, but he is in the hands of his political friends and feels that he will have to do what the party leaders think he should. "It is a foregone conclusion," said a man yesterday, who is in confidence of both men, "that Clatsop. Lane and Marion counties will be for Dunbar for the secretaryship. The four strongest counties in Eastern Oregon —Baker, Umatilla, Wasco and Union, wil be for Furnish tor governor, and each county has its own candidate for a minor place on the ticket, except Umatilla. Therefore, Mr. Williamson stands small chance of being in the race for secretary of state, and it is doubtful if he will have even his own immediate vicinity back of him in the

state convention. "On the other hand, opposition has been manifested against Moody, and the belief is current that the element in the party opposed to him has practically received a promise from Williamson that he will make the fight."

Mr. Williamson expects to confer with local party leaders here, and before he returns perhaps he may be able to make a definite announcement.
