THEY LACK STEERS

THINK CATTLE STRAYED FROM USUAL RANGE.

Cattle Missing From the Roundup, Owned by Several Umatilla County Men—C. B. Wade Says He Believes Most of Them Will Turn Up.

It is learned that some of the cattle men are short some cattle that should have been accounted for in the fall roundups, and that riders are now on the range looking for them. C. B. Wade misses 25 head from his 600, the usual loss being about 3 per cent., or 20 out of a band of 600. Others are missing in large proportion, this being true in the cases of Charles White, who lacks 20 out of 75; Ed Cheney, who lacks 19 out of 60; and Dave Ingram, who is short 15 out of 60.

The men owning these missing cattle were seen, and stated that they thought the cattle would be found to have strayed from their usual range, and that is the reason why they were not rounded up with the others.

All were asked regarding the probability of the cattle having been stolen, and they said in each case that they thought not.

Mr. Wade said that during the past few months an enormous amount of land has been taken up in the range districts, and that everyone, of course, takes watered tracts, when they can. This has deprived the cattle of their accustomed watering places, and has caused them to wander farther away than usual. He looks for the cattle to be found.

R. B. Stanfield, of the Butter Creek country, was in town and stated to the East Oregonian that cattlemen down there have not lost more than 2 per cent. of their stock, that being 1 per cent. under the average for the past years. He confirms the theory of Mr. Wade that the missing cattle are missing because they were compelled to go farther away on account of the unusual lack of water.

CHINESE BULLET HIT HIM.

Artilleryman From Fort Walla Walla Who Fought in the Orient.

Trumpeter Johnny Lauren and Sergeant James Bloom, of the 20th field battery, stationed at Fort Walla Walla were in the city yesterday on a furlough. They both spent 19 months in China and were in the siege at Tien Tsin, where Sergeant Bloom received a slight wound in the leg from a Chinese bullet. They say the report a few weeks ago that smallpox had broken out at the barracks was greatly overdrawn, and that only one case developed. That is now over and everything is running smoothly at the fort.

On December 18, Mrs. J. F. Jenkins, of Pilot Rock, died, aged 51. She leaves a husband and five children. Interment on December 20. The Rev. R. A. Coppie officiated.

Chinese Loan in France.

Paris, Dec. 21.—The new loan of 265,000,000 francs was issued today. The loan is in 3 per cent. perpetual rentes and is for the purpose of reimbursing the French treasury for its outlay as a result of the Chinese expedition and to pay indemnities to sufferers in connection with the expedition. Payments will be made in four installments, beginning today and ending May 31.

Paris, Dec. 21.—At a meeting of the Panama Canal company this afternoon the shareholders authorized the company to conclude the sale of the canal to the United States practically on that government's own terms.

Pendleton Academy Is to Play Against an Eleven From Walla Walla.

Still there is some football enthusiasm among the local teams. Manager Robert Pond has arranged a game to be played in this city, beginning at 2 o'clock p. m., Christmas day, between his team, the Academy, and a Walla Walla eleven. This game was to have been between the Academy and the Walla Walla high school teams, but manager Galbraith has sent Manager Pond wrote that his team had disbanded and that they would be unable to play the return game here. It will be remembered that Pendleton played the Walla Walla high school in the latter place two weeks ago and that they were to have come here to play on Christmas, but owing to the disbandment this game was called off and Walla Walla is going to pick up a team harring Whittmen men, to play the return.

In the game played in Walla Walla, Pendleton was beaten by a score of 12 to 5, and the local team is very much disappointed that the game here was called off, as they were in hopes of having a chance to retaliate. However, there will be a game and it is expected that it will be a hotly contested one as there has always been a strong rivalry between the two towns both in football and baseball.

SCHEME TO FLOOD THIS COUNTRY WITH CHINESE.

They Will Come in as Merchants Before Present Law Expires.

Port Townsend, Wash., Dec. 21.—The steamer Alice Gertrude from Neah Bay, Wash., reports that the Indians picked up two bottles on the beach south from Cape Flattery on Friday, supposed to be from the steamer Matewan.

The overdue China steamer Oopack arrived. A mishap to the machinery in mid-ocean occurred and she drifted for seven days helpless. Reports came of a scheme on foot in China to flood this country with Chinese. Merchant stock companies are organizing, capitalized for several millions, and stock issued to Chinese so they may gain entrance under the guise of merchants, before the present restriction law has expired.
