# WALLA WALLA BANKS HAVE GOOD SHOWINGS.

First National Has Million and a Half of Deposits.

Walla Walla, Dec. 23.—Despite the slow movement of wheat from this valley and the consequent scarcity of ready cash, business in this city shows up well, as will be seen from the statements of the two national banks, just published. The First National and the Baker-Boyer banks published their regular reports Saturday, in which the following excellent showing is made: Loans, \$967,399.63; due from banks and reserve agents, \$764,634.95; cash on hand, \$156,528; deposits subject to check, \$1,509,564.42. This showing of a million and a half of deposits in two of the three banks of the city at this season under present conditions, is considered unusual and very satisfactory. But little if any of the money from last crop of grain is accounted for in the statement, as but a very small portion of the crop has been moved. In addition to the deposit subject to check, time deposits have been made to the amount of \$213,885.26.

**Walla Walla Incurable.**

Walla Walla, Dec. 23.—Today Sheriff Keys started for Chehalis in charge of John Iait and Andrew Nutter, two more lads committed to the state reform school. The cases came up before Judge Brents on Saturday and the order was made after a severe lecture was given to the parents of the lads.

**School Attendance.**

Walla Walla, Dec. 23.—The report of the city schools for the month ending December 20 shows an enrollment of 1461 with but 79 cases of tardiness. The average daily attendance was 1332. Thirty-two teachers are employed in the schools.

**Rev. Mr. Bard in Germany.**

Walla Walla, Dec. 23.—Rev. Andreas Bard, rector of St. Paul's Episcopal church, who has been in the east for several months, has gone to his old home in Germany to spend the holidays. He expects to arrive in this city January 14, direct from Germany.

**John Justice's Funeral.**

Walla Walla, Dec. 23.—This afternoon occurred the funeral of John Justice, a pioneer of this city. The funeral was in charge of the local Masonic fraternity, the fire department attending in a body. John Justice died late Saturday night, after a short illness, aged 62 years. He was a pioneer of the coast, having landed in California in 1862. In 1867 he came to this city and entered business life.
