Of course that was not enough to take him home and Mr. Adams told him so. At this the young man acted very much disappointed and said he was going to "end it all." He acted so downhearted that Mr. Adams had a close watch on him until Monday evening when Mr. Adams, who had telegraphed to a sister in Denver, telling of his condition, received an answer stating that she had deposited money to pay his transportation home and he was put aboard the train and started for home.

Peters was not violently insane, but it was evident that he was mentally unbalanced and his condition solicited the sympathy of all who saw him. His story was that a few months ago he left Denver to join a friend at Ellensburg who was a railroad man and who had promised him work, but when he arrived the friend was gone and he could not find him.
