### POLITICS OF GOVERNORS.

#### List of the Executives Who Have Served the State of Oregon

In support of the general demand in Eastern Oregon that this part of the state be recognized in gubernatorial nominations, the Baker City Herald prints the following names and counties from which elected, dates of service and politics of all governors of Oregon since it became a state.

- 1—John Whiteaker, farmer and democrat, of Lane county, served from March 2, 1859, to September 10, 1862.
- 2—Addison C. Gibbs, lawyer and republican, from Portland, served from September 10, 1862, to September 14, 1866.
- 3—George L. Woods, lawyer and republican, from Wasco county, served from September 12, 1866, to September 14, 1870.
- 4—L. F. Grover, lawyer and democrat, from Marion county, served from September 12, 1870, to February 1, 1877, being re-elected, he filled out part of his second term when he was chosen United States senator and was succeeded as governor by Stephen F. Chadwick, who became the fifth governor.
- 5—Stephen F. Chadwick, lawyer and democrat, from Douglas county, who served as governor from February 1, 1877, to September 11, 1878.
- 6—Walter W. Thayer, lawyer and democrat, from Portland, who served from September 11, 1878, to September 13, 1882.
- 7—Zenas F. Moody, merchant and republican, from Wasco county, who served from September 12, 1882, to January 12, 1887.
- 8—William Paine Lord, lawyer and republican, from Portland, who served from January 12, 1887, to January 10, 1890.
- 9—Theodore T. Geer, farmer and republican, who took office January 15, 1890, and is the present governor.

5—Stephen F. Chadwick, lawyer and democrat, from Douglas county, who served as governor from February 1, 1877, to September 11, 1878.

## GRANT COPELAND

### TALKS ABOUT NATIONAL LIVESTOCK ASSOCIATION.

What Delegates Did Bearing on Interests of Stockmen in the West—Many Full-Blooded Animals Coming to Oregon.

Representative Grant Copeland, who was in Pendleton Tuesday on his way home to Walla Walla from the National Livestock Association, held in Chicago, to which he was a delegate from Washington, gave out the following interview concerning what the association did toward furthering the interests of the stockmen in this Western country.

"Two important questions affecting this country were discussed by the association. The range leasing law was primary in importance. On this question stockmen were unanimous in thinking some action must be taken at once. This period is considered as a crisis in the stock industry in the West and Southwest, and I think that either at this session of congress or some time in the near future it will be settled. A law which will permit stockmen to get hold of more land under restrictions appears to be necessary.

"The association unanimously approved the bill now before congress requiring woolen goods to be sold on their merits, making shippers label them 'shoddy' if that is their quality, and so on.

"It was hard to get a good attendance at the association because of the international fat stock show which was going on at the time. The average attendance at the association would be between 20,000 and 30,000, and it is estimated there were 300,000 extra people in the city on account of both conventions.

"Some full-blooded livestock is coming West as a result of the fat stock show. W. O. Miner, of Heppner, is making importations, while C. B. Wade, of Pendleton, unloaded a car at his Grand Ronde ranch Monday and C. E. Ladd, of Portland, brought some of the fine animals West. The fat stock show, which was a magnificent affair, brought out several hundred head of stock from all over the world whose average value would be \$1000. I should say it was a mistake, however, to hold both conventions at the same time as the fat stock show drew materially away from the attendance at the other."

#### Met the President.

Mr. Copeland visited Chicago, Boston, New York, Baltimore and Washington and at the latter place he was introduced to President Roosevelt, at the White House. About him he said:

"I found sentiment in Washington greatly in favor of President Roosevelt, who seems to be enjoying tremendous popularity. He is a brilliant man, pleasant to meet, keenly alive to everything in the country, and impresses one as being absolutely fearless. When I met him he was preparing to go on a hunting trip in the Alleghenies."

#### Easterners Looking Westward.

"I found Easterners looking toward the West. Between now and 14 years ago, when I made a trip to the Atlantic Coast, there has been a wonderful change in the knowledge and sentiment displayed by Easterners toward this country. People I met are fairly well informed now. There will be as a result a wonderful tide of immigration to the Pacific Coast.

"Trade conditions throughout the East are good. In New York and Boston business is on the rush all the time, and it was the same wherever I went. Climate, considering the time of year was good until I started on the return journey, when it became very cold. It was 14 degrees below zero at Chicago on my way back and the temperature was low through Iowa and Nebraska."

### A TENNESSEE ROMANCE.

The Play of the "Romance of Coon Hollow" at the Frazer.

One to be transported among the most romantic Southern scenes, has only to see the production of "A Romance of Coon Hollow," which will hold the stage at the Frazer opera house, January 1. Here, mirrored by nature, in beauty and quaintness, are given pictures of life in old Tennessee. It is a story of love and jealousy, told in a graceful way, and given realism by stage effects that are reflections of every-day life in the South. Among the scenes are a plantation cotton compress in operation, and a moonlight revelation of the famous glen Coon Hollow, with electric and lime light effects in which the droopings fit through the trees and the night birds sing among the branches; another a night view, depicts the historic Mississippi river boat race between the Robert E. Lee and the Naches, both brilliantly lighted and under full steam. On the levee a group of darkey boys and girls troop down to see the great boats pass and while waiting, indulge in jubilee singing, and buck and wing dancing. A well selected company, headed by John Popperoy, will appear in the production, which is now in its eighth season of success.

### GOES IN THE IMPLEMENT BUSINESS.

E. P. Marshall Buys E. L. Smith's Implement Business.

A deal has been consummated by which E. P. Marshall becomes owner of the implement business formerly conducted by E. L. Smith, on the corner of Court and Johnson streets. Mr. Marshall will take possession the first of the year. This deal does not include the combined harvester business which Mr. Smith has been conducting in connection with the implement business, the sale being made principally because he wanted to devote his whole time to this special line of work, which is enough in itself to require all of his time. Both lines of business will for the present at least be conducted in the same building, as heretofore, although will be run under two separate managements.

Mr. Marshall is too well known in this city and country to need any introduction to the people. He will take hold of the business in his usual enterprising manner and expects to carry a large stock of all kinds of farming implements and vehicles and in addition to the present stock, which will invoice at about \$10,000, he will lay in a much larger stock in the early spring.

This meeting is called for the purpose of electing officers and effecting a permanent organization to make arrangements for the big time which the Woodmen on this side of the mountains expect to have.
