GENERAL NEWS

The London Times publishes an editorial on the pretensions of continental newspapers that it was Russia, not England, that prevented European intervention in the Russo-American war.

The first Christian daily newspaper in the world to be established in Tokio, Japan, by a native, I. Kowai, who is now in this country making purchases of materials for conducting such a plant.

A young woman known as "Frances Ross," supposed to have escaped from a Portland convent, was adjudged insane at Chicago, experts testifying she suffered from melancholia. She had jewels and money to the value of \$3500 when taken into custody.

The register and receiver of the Kallispell land office have received a letter from the interior department, instructing the withdrawal of all lands from settlement in Montana north and west of the Kootenai river. The order will involve over 200,000 acres of land in Idaho.
