## O.R.&N. LITERATURE

PASSENGER DEPARTMENT TO FURNISH IT FREE.

Special Low Rates on Railroads From East to West Will Be in Force in 1902, and the Tide of Incoming Humanity is Expected to Flow Strong.

The passenger department of the O. R. & N. company was asked to furnish the East Oregonian with any information regarding their work during the coming year. Both the request and reply in this particular instance was delayed, with the result that the O. R. & N.'s contribution did not appear with the statements of the other railroads, interested in the growth and settlement of the Inland Empire. A. L. Craig, passenger agent of the O. R. & N., writes as follows:

It is now pretty generally appreciated by railroads entering Oregon and other Northwestern states, that the first requisite to the upbuilding of the cities and towns and for a steady and sustained increase in earnings, is the development of the country. If the farm land is taken up and put under cultivation the towns will take care of themselves and must grow in proportion to the demands of the contiguous country for larger and better markets.

To the end that the agricultural, horticultural, grazing and mining lands may be developed to their full capacity the railroads in particular are spending large sums annually for printed matter describing the various districts and employing men especially to interest and secure for the section in which they are interested, any desirable families now located in the older settled portions of our country. While the primary object of such expenditures is of course a selfish one, the result is of great benefit to the whole community.

Following periods of severe business depression, such as that of 1892, to 1897, through which we have just passed, there is always a considerable movement westward. It, however, takes time for Easterners to get affairs in shape which will permit them to follow his inclination to go West. The new home must be determined upon and property disposed of.

The coming year promises to bring to successful fruition some of the good work and advertising expended throughout the Eastern states in the past few years. Oregon and the Pacific Northwest is the Mecca towards which many Eastern faces are now turning, and the present prospect for a large movement in that direction was never brighter at the opening of any new year than now.

Anticipating a large business and with a great desire to make the movement as large as possible, special low rates for settlers have been announced for March and April, 1902. This will enable the intending settler to reach Oregon as cheaply as if he were bound for some other point much nearer to his present home.

The O. R. & N. company, in connection with its parent company, the Union Pacific, is doing its full share towards assisting in this great work, and it is our full expectation that we will bring into this state during 1902 thousands of new and desirable settlers who will find new and happy homes in the great state of Oregon.

Much assistance can be given the railroads in inducing immigration by those now residing in our state, if each person will appoint himself an immigration agent to the extent of writing and sending printed matter to their old friends in the East. ### STOCK YARDS AT PASCO.

Northern Pacific Contemplates Building Them and Making That Place a Central Point for Stock Shipments.

S. B. Calderhead, general freight and passenger agent for the W. & C. R., who was in the city yesterday, stated to an East Oregonian reporter that the Northern Pacific company was contemplating building stock yards at Pasco. This move is contemplated for the reason that the railroad companies are required by law to stop, feed and water stock every 28 hours and stock coming from different points in Washington now have to be stopped off at Ellensburg or North Yakima, and these are neither as centrally located as Pasco. If the company had yards at the latter place it would be a sort of central point from all different points on their line where they could be shipped, stopped and fed, then reloaded and sent on to their destination at Grand Coulee. If this is done an exclusive stock car will be put on from Pasco to Seattle and Tacoma.

### W. & C. STOCK YARDS.

New Cattle Shipping Quarters in the South Part of Pendleton.

Work has been finished on the W. & C. R. stock yards, just west of their depot, on Webb street, and Contractor C. B. Richardson has returned to his home in Walla Walla.

In speaking of the new yards on Thursday evening, General Ticket and Freight Agent S. B. Calderhead said: "They are the finest yards in the northwest," and such is the fact. The yards are 100x200 feet and are divided into seven different corrals, each being 40x50 feet, with a lane

running through the center the full length, and two gates opening out into this lane, or alley, from each corral. They are built with two loading places, so that stock can be loaded into two cars at the same time. Each of these loading places have two chutes to be used in case of loading sheep or hogs into a double-deck car. These chutes run up side by side, and one goes into the lower deck of the car while the other is more elevated and goes into the upper deck. This is something new for this country, and will prove quite a success as the whole car can be loaded while the lower deck was loaded in the old way.

The corral is 10 feet high, built of 2x10 lumber, with posts 6x8, set deep in the ground, and the gate posts much larger than this. To do away with the mud that otherwise would be a nuisance in the yards, the company is going to have a layer of crushed rock put on the ground. This is built very substantially and cost the company between \$1200 and \$1500.

Yo-Koot-Sa, an Indian, has filed papers against Louis Bergevin et al., in behalf of his ward, Am-Nap-Um, 3 years old, whose mother is dead, asking the court that defendants, who are now living on land on the reservation allotted the mother by the government, pay to him the sum of \$80 as rent for the place this year and that they be constrained from living on the land hereafter or in any way using it to their interests.
