### WASHINGTON'S CONVICTS.

The "Crop" in 1901 Larger Than in Any Year—King County Leads.

Walla Walla, Dec. 28.—Three hundred and twenty-one men have been received at the state penitentiary during 1901, up to this morning, with prospects of at least a dozen more before the close of the year. This record shows that the population has increased twice as fast this year as in any previous similar period.

King county heads the list in furnishing criminals with 94 to her credit, while Spokane is second with 39. Snohomish county sent more than Pierce, having 27, while Pierce has but 24. Walla Walla sent 16 and Whatcom followed with 13. For once Whitman reduced her record to 3.

During the year several counties have sent no men to prison, the list including Asotin, Clallam, Ferry, Franklin, Garfield, Island, Klickitat, San Juan, Skamania and Wahkiakum. But one man was received from Adams, Chelan, Douglas, Lewis, Mason, Okanogan, Pacific. The total population today is 556, the largest in the history of the institution.

On Christmas day, 1898, the population was 205, in 1899, it was 352; 1900, 415.

Work has Begun on the Main Building—Foundation Finished.

St. Anthony's hospital will soon be numbered among the useful institutions of Pendleton. Work on the stone foundation began several weeks ago and is now completed. Work on the main building will begin in a short while.

A temporary hospital building has been provided by the sisters, and this will be ready for patients in two or three weeks. The hospital will be under the management of the Sisters of St. Francis, who have so successfully conducted St. Joseph academy.

Considerable interest has been taken and is being taken in the hospital by the people of Pendleton, more than \$5000 having been subscribed to it by popular subscription, and now there is talk of endowing cots and beds. The first to set the example in this connection, is Mrs. A. M. Clark, of the Peoples Warehouse, who has generously offered to furnish a bed, and this offer the Sisters greatly appreciate, and hope others will do likewise.

### THE RABBIT DRIVE.

A Train Load of Pendleton People Will be in Attendance.

The rabbit drive, so long talked about is now an assured success. Two or three men were out Thursday and Friday with papers, and secured 190 names who promised to go, thus making the number necessary for the special train in case the regular is late. If No. 1 is on time or not later than 9 o'clock, extra coaches will be added to it, to take the crowd to the mouth of Butter Creek, where the drive is to be, but if it is later than this, a special train will be run, leaving here about 7 a. m., returning in the evening.

It is expected that at least 150 will go from Pendleton, and a special train will also come from Hesperia with at least 100 from that place beside those in the vicinity of the drive who will attend. A special rate of \$1 has been secured from the O. R. & N. Co. for the round trip.

## IN THE WILLAMETTE

NEED OF GOVERNMENT MONEY AT YAQUINA BAY.

Its Expenditure as Necessary for the Willamette Valley, as the Improvement of the Columbia River is to Eastern Oregon.

Philomath, Or., Dec. 28.—The Eastern Oregonian who comes down into the Willamette valley to look about among the "local issues," runs plump up against the proposition of a needed appropriation for the improvement of Yaquina Bay. Up in the eastern part of the state, we are accustomed to regard it as one of the "local grafts" that Congressman Tongue, of Hillsboro, is all the time asking the federal government to give to his constituents. But if one will look at the matter in the light of the industrial demands of the valley, he will be compelled to admit that the improvement of Yaquina Bay is just as much a local necessity for a very rich region of Oregon as the improvement of the Columbia river is for that which we call the Inland Empire.

### The Road Built in 1885.

The Corvallis & Eastern is a road that was built in 1885 by William Hogue, who lives in San Francisco, and who was compelled to allow the system to go at forced sale a few years ago. A. B. Hammond, who built the Astoria road, bought it. It is believed here that it was bought for the Southern Pacific company and that it is controlled in the interest of that big system.

As a result of this policy, the road is now leading an existence that suggests early demise, or continuance during the coming years with the minimum of railroad vitality. There is nothing of progress evinced in the management, and the company apparently is content to permit the country dependent upon it to go without the service it should give.

When Mr. Hogue built the road, he placed in operation a line of six steamers plying from Yaquina Bay to San Francisco, and an immense quantity of freight was carried. Farmers hereabouts, and along the 142 miles of lines, received 4 to 5 cents a bushel more for their wheat than farmers in other parts of the valley. When the Southern Pacific were taken off and now all freight coming and going is carried by rail. The people of this country are denied the advantages in the leveling of rates that always comes from water competition with rail lines, and they suffer correspondingly.

### At the Mercy of the S. P.

In other words, it places the country absolutely at the mercy of the Southern Pacific company, and that is not desirable for any region—to lack competitive rates of transportation systems.

The federal improvements asked are for the bay at Newport, where already the government has built jetties which actually keep the harbor clear from bars, and make it an ideal place for shipping, excepting that there is a reef that should be blasted away.

It is this that the people want the government to do, and it is this that the government will not do, presumably because of the influence of the big rail lines, that see to it that the Washington government does not spend any money to give the people what they want.

The bay would have 30 feet of water for deep sea-going vessels, were that reef blasted, and it seems to be unjust that it is not done.

This is the Willamette valley view of the proposition, and it really appeals to a visitor as based upon undeniable justice. Everything bears out the contention of the valleyites. The condition of the country, the need for relief, the run-down agency, because of a country that is one of the garden spots made by the Creator for the habitation of man.

### It is Fit for the Gods.

For the Willamette valley is a region in which the gods of old might have dwelt. It is rich in resources. It is productive land, it is beautiful in appearance. Here are all things needed by the farmer and fruit-raiser and livestock breeder. Nothing lacks but something, and that something cannot be told in one short letter. No one living here denies that the country needs something and needs it hard, very hard, needs it worse than any other part of Oregon needs anything that it now has not.

### Settled in the Long Ago.

The C. & E. runs from Yaquina to Idanha, a point 142 miles inland from the bay. This country as all know who have ever seen it, is settled and has been settled since the beginning of time for "The Oregon Country." Yet it spite of the generations that have come and gone here, and the decades of history back of it, it presents a peculiar combination of conditions.

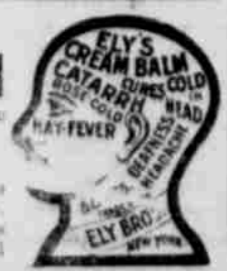
