FOUNDER OF THE ELKS.

Charles Vivian Was His Name and he was Known all Over Oregon.
Back in 1879, when Leadville was the premier mining town of Colorado, Judge W. B. Heyburn, now of Wallace, Idaho, was beginning to be known as an expert legal authority on mining affairs. He was then, as he is now, a good fellow, and the other brilliant youngsters who contributed the leaven of culture to the uncouth frontier city, says the Oregonian.
Among other men who happened in Leadville was one Charles Vivian, an English song and dance comedian, who, with John F. Proctor, known to all old showmen, concluded that it was time to introduce "Pinafords" to the Leadville elite. Vivian had some

two or three years ago organized an informal association of actors, which later developed into the Elks of the present day.

Judge Hayburn and Vivian had met before, and the former extended his friend the courtesies of his bachelor apartments in the building in which his office was located. The climate of Leadville was unusually severe that winter, and Vivian contracted a bad cold, which developed into pneumonia, and ultimately resulted in his death in Judge Heyburn's rooms. At that time the Elks held but a faint promise of the splendid organization of today and its membership was confined largely to theatrical performers.

Vivian had lived the life of an im-provident Bohemian, and dying as he did, with thousands of miles of land and water separating him from his English home, he was practically among strangers. Judge Heyburn defrayed the expenses of interment in Greenwood cemetery and caused an appropriate monument to be erected marking Vivian's last resting place. There he sleeps today, while the order he founded has gone forward to magnificent success, and his name is remembered by thousands who revere his memory.

The story of Vivian's death has never been told before, and would not have been, in all probability, except for a little informal gathering at the Portland Christmas day, of showmen and others, of which Judge Heyburn was a member.
