## NATURAL PHENOMENON.

Reported by Camas Prairie Stockmen to Correspondent at Alba.

A strange natural phenomenon is reported by the Camas Prairie stockmen returning from summer ranges or from cattle buying trips in the Wallowa country. According to them the freak has never become known outside the Wallowa district, but is said to be worth going hundreds of miles to see. The scene is at Wallowa Lake, the well-known summer resort, and the phenomenon is a mirage of remarkable distinctness. Objects on one side of the lake appear to a man at a certain angle on the other to be rushing rapidly up the hillside into the clouds. A herd of cattle being driven past the lake homeward both Camas Prairie herders was seen to go straight skyward to the horror of the deluded spectator on the opposite side. The phenomenon is supposed to be an ordinary mirage rare in this country and common in some parts of the world.

## POISONED SIXTEEN CHILDREN.

How This Dreadful Act Occurred in St. Louis a Few Weeks Ago.

Before the tetanus court of inquiry at St. Louis, Henry R. Taylor, janitor for the chemical and bacteriological divisions of the health department, admitted under oath that he issued for public use the toxic anti-diphtheritic serum, which caused the recent deaths of sixteen children in that city from tetanus. He distributed the vials, properly labeled, he said, because the supply of diphtheria antitoxine had become exhausted early in October, and he did not believe that the serum was "bad enough to kill children."

Taylor is a negro. He has held city positions for many years. In addition to his duties as janitor he acted as assistant to Consulting City Bacteriologist Amand Ravold. More or less in the capacity of an assistant he had charge of the anti-toxine when it was in flasks and after it had been poured into the vials for distribution to physicians.

For two hours Taylor was closeted with Chief of Detectives Desmond. Taylor was placed on the witness stand with the chief of detectives at his side. Mayor Wells advised Taylor to give a distinct, true, connected relation of facts appertaining to the toxic serum. Taylor then admitted that his former testimony in which he swore that serum of September 26 had not been distributed, was false. Taylor said positively that he gave out serum of the make of September 30. This serum, it is alleged, was responsible for the deaths of 16 or more children.

Taylor said the serum of September 30 was not destroyed until after the trouble began, and that he had been trying to "protect the whole of it."
