**BETWEEN THE HEPNER

**The Teams Were Evenly Matched—
 The Crowd Loud and Enthusiastic—

This was the way the football game stood New Year's afternoon when time was called. The honors were evenly divided between the two teams. The game was the best played in this city since the football season opened and both Heppner and Pendleton played clean ball from start to finish, their being no hard feeling or rough slugging done. Although the Heppner eleven out-weighted the locals about 12 pounds on the average, the home boys held them down very well.

Heppner won the toss-up and kicked off to the Pendleton players at 2:20 and the game was on. During the first half the ball was most of the time in the center of the field, neither team making gains until the latter part, when Heppner got a little the best of the home boys and when time was called they had the ball on their 15-yard line.

In the second half the ball swayed back and forth more and several punts were made by both sides. PENDLETON FIRE DEPARTMENT.

**Report of Chief Shows There Were
 Twenty-four Alarms Turned in Dur-
 ing 1901.**

Chief Engineer H. J. Stillman has returned his report to the city council for the work of the Pendleton fire department for the year 1901. This report shows that 24 alarms were turned in and the total damage from fire and water did not exceed \$2500. This is a good showing, and when the number of fires are taken into consideration, is prima facie evidence that the fire department is under efficient management and that to Chief Stillman and the men under him are due much credit for such a good record. All the fire departments have a membership of 102 officers and men who are divided into different companies as follows:

Protection Company No. 1, 15 men; Albert Company No. 2, 15; Hose Company No. 3, 15; Hose Company No. 4, 14; Hose Company No. 5, 13; Hose Company No. 6, 15; Rescue Hook and Ladder Company No. 1, 15.

TRAGEDY AT ADAMS

**YOUNG WOMAN WITH KNIFE
 AND PISTOL ATTACKS MAN.**

**She Failed to Inflict Any Injury Upon
 Him and He Has Left for Parts
 Unknown.**

The story has just leaked out from Adams that a shooting scrape occurred in that place last Sunday, in which two prominent young people, one a young woman of 19 summers, and the other a young farmer of that neighborhood, played the principal parts. The actors in the tragedy are Doc Whitely and Miss Lillian Levandore. Whitely is a young farmer, working near Adams, and Miss Levandore is a popular girl of that town. The story of the shooting and what led up to it, as told the East Oregonian, is as follows:

Doc Whitely and Miss Lillian Levandore had been keeping company for some time and as the story goes, were engaged, but for reasons of his own, the young man had grown somewhat cold in his affection toward her and she had sworn vengeance against him. She armed herself with a knife and gun and went out to look for her faithless lover. They met on the street Sunday afternoon and she attempted to carve him, but failed. She was not to be halted in her determination to get "even," so attempted to draw a revolver. Whitely grappled with her and about this time a friend of the young woman's came up and struck him a blow, which felled him to the ground, letting her go away. She then fired several shots at him, but her aim was bad and none of them found their intended mark.

This ended the trouble for Sunday evening, but it is alleged that Miss Levandore, not satisfied with what she had accomplished toward getting "even" with her lover who had proven himself so unworthy of her love, and went gunning for him again the next day. In the meantime, however, Whitely had come to the conclusion that the neighborhood was getting too crooked for him and he left at once for parts unknown. The East Oregonian would have published the facts as here given in Tuesday's issue had it not been informed by a reliable party that no such occurrence took place at Adams on the day in question.
