WHEAT AT 49 AND 50 CENTS BEGINNING THE NEW YEAR.

Prices Will Continue About the Same
for Some Time—Buyers Look for
No Change.

Wheat begins the new year at 49 and 50 cents, but there is none on the market. Since the middle of January there has only been one sale that amounted to anything and that was the Rigby's, who sold 60,000 bushels a week ago at 50 cents. What the future has in store for those who are holding for higher prices is more than any one can tell and local buyers will not venture an assertion further than that they think prices will continue about the same for some time. They do not look for any material change either way.

Wheat in Portland.

Portland, Jan. 2.—The Commercial Review, in its report of the wheat market for the past week, says in its issue today:
The first half of the cereal year of 1901 and 1902 is past and the shipments of flour and wheat (flour reduced to wheat) has been very gratifying to the export interests of the Pacific Northwest. About 19,000,000 bushels of wheat has been disposed of, and there is still considerable to go out; and we look for greater activity in shipping circles the next three months than has ever been witnessed heretofore during the same period. There is a very large fleet of vessels at Portland and Tacoma loading or preparing to load. The present month of January will be a record-breaker in wheat shipments. The market during the past week has been more of a holiday nature than anything else. There has been spasmodic spurts in prices wholly unwarranted by the conditions that exist, and evidently some one in the trade is short of grain. Prices at one time were marked up 2c per bushel higher than any one interested in the market really could afford to pay. Very little selling took place even at the advance, as sellers were very firm in their decisions and refuse to part with their holdings only at a material advance that at the present time is rather problematical whether the same can be obtained.
Arrivals of ships at Portland are large, and over 20 ships are waiting to put their cargo on board. Those at the docks are receiving prompt dispatch and suffer no detention for lack of grain. As fast as dock room is secured others take their place. There is plenty of wheat in the interior warehouses belonging to the exporters that was recently bought and is coming down fairly well, as rapidly as cars can be had and bring the same to tide water. Prices at the present are for club wheat, 60 and 61 cents; bluestem, 62 cents per bushel; valley wheat is not in great demand by exporters on account of the high prices prevailing, and millers are the only purchasers of the same. WHEAT IN SAN FRANCISCO.

San Francisco, Jan. 2.—The market here during the past week has been rather steady, and while shippers have good-sized stocks on hand and are neither active nor eager to make purchases, they will nevertheless make good firm offers to all samples submitted. The market at the present time than it has been for many months passed. Foreign advices have had a firmer tone and a good demand comes from England. The export movement continues quite heavy and the prospects of the new crop are still very good. Shipment of Horses.

Walla Walla, Jan. 2.—Over 150 carloads of horses were shipped from the Walla Walla valley by the Washington & Columbia river railway during the past year, the shipments being made from this city and Pendleton, principally. The line is but 100 miles in length and the number of horses shipped over the road is considered phenomenal. Most of these horses have been sent to South Africa for the British army, but a number of cars were made up of heavy draft stock for the Eastern market. About 4000 head of horses were in the shipments.

Shipments of Flour.

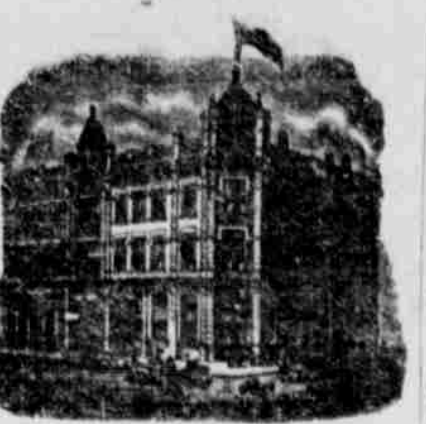
