GENERAL NEWS

The entire Eastern Palma ticket was elected in Cuba Wednesday.

Official returns show that the four losses by killed and wounded and surrendered during 1901, totalled 14,887.

By a decisive score of 46 to 0 the Michigan University football team defeated Stanford University at Pasadena, Cal., on Wednesday.

The jubilee enforcement fund of the Young Men's Christian association received funds amounting to \$43,257, making the total \$783,500. This leaves \$219,500 to be raised in order to raise the \$1,000,000 desired.

William Jessup, founder of the great harvest concern which bears his name, has retired from active business, leaving the company to his sons, Charles and James, and his son-in-law, Richard F. Howe.

Governor Seaside of Nebraska, has granted an unconditional pardon to Joseph S. Hartley, ex-convict, treasurer, who five years ago was sentenced to twenty years in the penitentiary on conviction of having embezzled \$20,000 of state funds.

William J. Wood, night clerk at the postoffice at St. Paul, Minn., was arrested on the charge of stealing money from letters. The arrest was made at the instance of Postoffice Inspector Kinschall, who had been working on the case for three years.

Five of the general informants at the United States military prison at Alcatraz Island on Sunday drank a beverage of which wood alcohol formed the principal part. On Tuesday morning the bodies of two of them were buried and the other three are still in the hospital.

The general assembly of Maryland began its deliberations Wednesday and after a brief session adjourned in a week in order to allow the two houses time to make up their committees. D. L. Mitchell of Hartford county was elected speaker of the house, and Senator John Hubner of Baltimore county was re-elected president of the senate. All of the officers of the last session were re-elected in both houses. This legislature will elect A. P. Gorman, democrat, to the United States senate.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS

The San Francisco mint has just completed a coinage record which makes 1901 the banner year in its history, \$81,972,536 having been converted into coin.

More than a thousand chickens are now making part of the showing at the seventh annual exhibition of the Oregon State Poultry Association, at Merrill's Sixth street cyclerly at Portland.

Colonel E. F. Hand, who arrived at Seattle from Java, states that cholera is raging more severely there than ever before this year. The death record in the city of Surabaya during the month of November, he states, was over 7000.

Eugene Hector, formerly financial editor of a Chicago newspaper, shot and killed an alleged highwayman in Chicago. The man killed is supposed to be a Bostonian named Donovan. The dead man was shot through the right eye.

Putnam M. Bradford, who died at his home at Hood river, Tuesday, was a prominent figure in the early history of Oregon. He was aged 75 years, and a native of Massachusetts. He was the eighth lineal descendant of George William Bradford, of Plymouth Colony.

A fire visited Cove, Union county, Wednesday. Four buildings were entirely destroyed, and the amount of insurance carried was small. The fire originated in the saloon of James Bloom. The losers are: James Bloom, \$700, no insurance; James Trappler, loss \$2000, insurance, 1600; Alexander Bros., loss \$500, insurance, \$200; John Mitchell, loss \$500, no insurance.

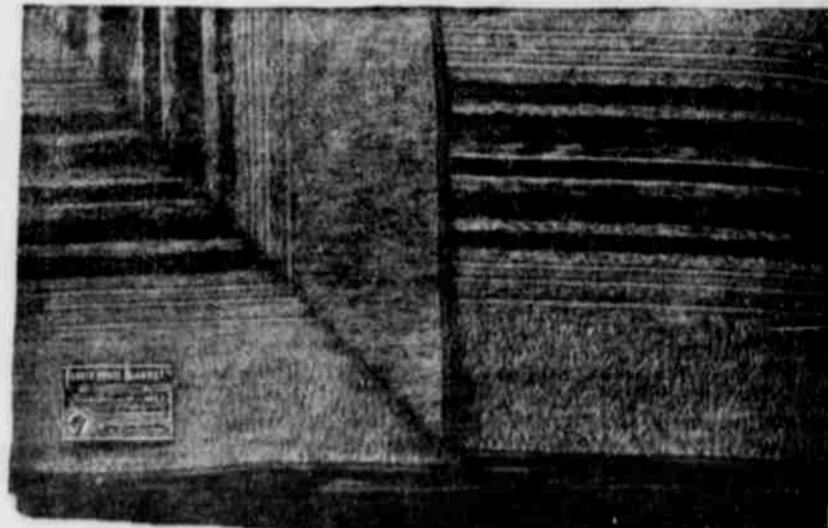
