Stroke of Apoplexy.

At his home at Athena, on Thursday, J. J. McConnell, formerly a resident of Pendleton, suffered a stroke of apoplexy. His condition today is somewhat improved. The Athena Press says: It is thought Mr. McConnell's illness is the indirect result of a runaway that happened him while in Pendleton the fore part of the week. With the aid of a small boy, he righted a heavy hack, which had been overturned. On the return home while near Adams, Mr. McConnell was suddenly stricken speechless, and Mrs. McConnell drove the team the rest of the way home. Mr. McConnell's right side is affected.

Fire in Omaha.

Omaha, Jan. 4.—Fire early this morning destroyed the plants of the Douglas Printing Company, Frontier Steam Laundry Company and the Western Electric Supply Company. The loss is \$100,000.

NEW YEAR'S PRESENT FAILED.

The Death of Governor Rogers Prevented Its Delivery.

Walla Walla, Jan. 4.—At the state penitentiary a man mourns the death of Governor Rogers sincerely, and he longs for a New Year's present that never came. The man is Frank Gaby, a convict from Snohomish county, who came to this city to reside in 1897, for manslaughter.

Gaby's friends prepared an application for pardon, and secured a petition signed by over 400 citizens of the county, asking that Gaby be given his freedom. Acting upon his best judgment, Governor Rogers agreed to make the pardon effective New Year's day, and Gaby fully expected to be set free Wednesday. But before the pardon had been issued and signed, Governor Rogers was taken ill and in a few days was dead. It is understood that among the first of Governor Melbride's acts will be the signing of this pardon, to make good the promise of the dead governor.

Gaby shot a man in the Palace dance hall in Everett, in September, 1897, while quarreling over a game of cards.
