

Only recently in conversation with a gentleman in Salt Lake, he deplored the fact that they were not raising anything like as many good apples in that territory as they formerly did, owing to the growers not taking proper care of their trees and fruit, and permitting the insects to get a foothold to such an extent that the crops had been reduced materielly in quantity and quality. Oregon apples have so great a reputation in the Eastern markets that it is of prime importance that the quality should be maintained."
