NORTHWEST WOOL GROWERS WILL MEET IN HELENA.

Delegates Will Go From Pendleton Early in February.

The next meeting of the Northwest Wool Growers' Association, for the territory including Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming and Utah, will be held in Helena, Montana, beginning first Tuesday in February. This district includes 579,900 square miles of territory and represents 18,000,000 sheep all told. Montana is in the lead as to number of sheep, that state boasting of having more than any other state in the union. Statistics show 8,990,000 head when fall feeding began. Oregon comes next along the line with 2,000,000, leaving only 8,990,000 to be divided among the other four states. At this meeting delegates will be elected to go to the national Livestock and Woolgrowers Association, to be held in St. Paul next fall, during the month of December.

John P. McManus, editor and manager of the Northwest Livestock and Woolgrowers' Journal, and Charles Cunningham, one of the most extensive sheep men in Oregon, will represent this county at the Helena con-
