There is money on hand or within call amounting to about \$14,000, contributed for the erection of a monument to the soldiers of the Second Oregon who fell in the Philippines or who perished on the outward or return voyage. Of this amount \$12,710.94 lies in the First National Bank of Portland. The legislature at its recent session was asked to appropriate a sum sufficient to make the whole amount of this sum \$20,000; but the bill did not pass.

Wheat 50½ for Export—51½ for Utah Use.

The local wheat market is still strong at 50½ cents for export and 51½ for Utah and Eastern markets. The largest sale noted in the county during the week was 60,000 bushels, sold by Thomas Kirk, at Athena yesterday, and outside of this probably 10,000 bushels has been sold. The Eastern markets are just strong enough to make the farmers hold on to their wheat thinking that it is going to go higher.

SCHOOLS ALL HAVE INCREASED ATTENDANCE.

Institutions Have Flattering Prospects for the Coming Terms.
The educational institutions of Pendleton start out on the new year with very flattering prospects for the future. They are in better condition than ever before and all have increased enrollment over any other year in their existence.

Public Schools.
The public school buildings have been found inadequate for all the scholars that have crowded into them and it was found necessary to add more, consequently two large rooms are now almost finished on the west side of the Eugene Field school house on West Alta street, which will be ready for occupancy by the 27th, when the new term begins. One teacher will be added at this time and all the little folks who expect to attend during this term are requested to be present on the first day. Thirty new students were added Monday, on the opening of the school, after the holidays, and others are being enrolled every day beside many more that are yet to come. All branches of the school are in the very best of working order. The present enrollment will reach almost 1000, with an increase of 150 over this time last year.

Pendleton Academy.
The Pendleton Academy has an enrollment of 229, which is by far the largest it ever had. Ten new students were added Monday and several others are to come in later. Added interest is manifest among both students and faculty, and Rev. F. L. Forbes, who is at the head of this institution, says that it starts the new year with very bright prospects for its future. A new class in French has been added with Gene Reynolds as teacher. He is from Whitman College, where he formerly taught, and takes the place with the highest of recommendations.

COUNTY ASSESSOR HAS REDUCED EXPENSES.

George Buzan Makes a Showing of the Cost of His Department, Compared With Former Years.

NATURAL GAS AT EVERETT

Burst Forth and Killed W. D. Howard, a Workman.
Everett, Jan. 8.—With a rush and roar that sent a stream of mud and sand a hundred feet into the air, a natural gas well sprung into existence yesterday. So vast was the flow and so quickly did it come that W. D. Howard, one of the workmen was overcome and led before he could drag himself outside the range of the death dealing fumes. The flow of gas has been checked but the pressure continues unabated and rumbling can be heard continually from the top of the shaft. It was not even being searched for and the gas rush came as a complete surprise. A boring machine was inking an artesian well and it was hoped to secure water for irrigation purposes. At a depth of 500 feet the gas was struck. Following as it does the discovery of oil at Whatcom, today's discovery has created great excitement here.
