FOURTH IN TAXATION

State Levy by the Board Shows How the Expenses of Government are Borne.

The state board of tax levy has completed the computation and apportionment of the state tax levy of taxes for 1902, under the provisions of the new law for the raising of state taxes.

The total amount levied for state purposes is \$895,000, and for the Agricultural college \$25,000, giving a total of \$920,000 for the year 1902. This levy was made under the statute passed at the last session of the legislature, and is based on the average valuation of the property for the last five years. Below is given the statement of the board of levy and the table of apportionment
