## COMMERCE - TRADE

### CONDITION OF THE FRUIT AND GRAIN.

**Warm Weather Bodes no Good, Think Many, Because Cold May Come Later.**

What will happen to next year's fruit crop if there comes a severe cold snap? This is a question that is agitating the horticulturists of this country. Fruit tree buds have already begun to swell in some places, and while some are of the opinion that it would have to get very cold and freeze hard with a continuation of several days before any injury would be sustained at the present stage the trees are in, it is admitted by all with a little tone of alarm, that if the present warm weather continues many days longer and then turn cold suddenly and freeze hard, there would be grave danger, not only of a shortage of the fruit crop next year, but many trees would be killed. To kill the trees, however, it is thought that the thermometer would have to reach zero or go below, and that would be something unusual for this country after this time of year. However, all who have studied the conditions in this country and are in the fruit business, say that the present weather is not favorable to a big crop. It is too warm for the time of year and it will be a miracle if there is not cold enough yet to cause a shortage.

The outlook for a large wheat crop is not looked upon by the observant farmer as being anything like flattering. They say not enough moisture has fallen and that more than the usual amount of precipitation will have to come from this time on if the crops compare favorably with former years. The estimate as to the outlook varies with different localities and different men, but most of them say the prospect for 1922 crops lack from 15 to 25 per cent. of being as good as usual at this time of year. Of course, they all admit that there is plenty of time yet for moisture to fall and wet the ground sufficiently.

Exporters are only willing buyers when grain can be purchased at or near its market value, and as most of them having no pressing need of wheat or any unfilled engagements, there is very little competition and bids placed represent the actual basis of export values. Holders are not disposed to sell at present prices.
