### COUNTY ROAD MATTERS DISPOSED

Court—Appointed Two Over-seeers—Talk of Crusher.  
A considerable time was consumed by the county court in in-vestigating the merits of putting rock on the public highways. A little has been said recently in the line of road improve-ment. Some have argued that the best method of making good roads and having them perma-nent is to put on a coat of crushed rock. This question has been par-aded into with the view of buying rock crushers and working at its own expense. It has been reached so far, preferring to make a more

thorough investigation before taking action in the matter.  
The court has appointed two com-petent road makers to have charge of the county's roads, dividing the precincts as follows:  
F. H. Beath's district—Mountain, Cottonwood, North Milton, South Milton, Valley, Weston, East Weston, North Athena, South Athena, Vansy-cle, Helix, Adams, Ruddock, Bing-ham Springs, Juniper, Fulton.  
Thomas Jaques' district—Umatilla, Echo, Prosper, Union, Yoakum, Hogue, Vinson, Willow Springs, Alba, Ukiah, McKay, Pilot Rock, Gilliland, Encampment.

### WHEAT AT 52.

**J. B. Kennedy Sold at That Figure on Friday.**  
Yesterday afternoon wheat reached 52 cents per bushel. J. B. Kennedy sold his last year's crop, consisting of 11,854 bushels, to Thomas Mont- gomery, agent for the Puget Sound Warehouse Company, or a fraction over 52 cents. Immediately after selling his wheat, Mr. Kennedy closed a deal with E. P. Marshall for 160 acres of wheat land near Warren Station, paying \$6000 in cash there- fore. Mr. Kennedy was the only man to sell in Pendleton yesterday.
