ONE PIPE DREAM

CONCERNING ROAD "FROM HEPPNER TO SUSANVILLE."

A Correspondent Apparently Mixed in His Version of the Matter.

A correspondent writing for one of the East Oregonian's exchanges, under a Pendleton date line, but writing the article in question in another town, makes some amusing statements. He apparently has not traveled extensively through the country south from here, including the John Day region and that between Susanville and Heppner.

The article says that the business men of Heppner are building a wagon road from there to Susanville, a distance of 75 miles, and that the fact that work has commenced is not known in Pendleton. It is not known here nor in any other place on top of the mundane sphere, that the town of Heppner is "building a 75-mile wagon road to Susanville." And, as a matter of fact, it will never be known here or elsewhere that such a 75-mile road will be built.

What It Would Cost.

Such a road would cost more than \$25,000, judging from what the work cost on the road built several years ago in the southern part of this county leading to the north fork of the John Day river. Indeed, that 75-mile road would cost nearer to \$75,000, for the mountains over which it would have to cross to reach Heppner are steeper and more difficult of access than are those on the side towards Pendleton.

The article states that the road "would run southerly from Ritter." Ritter is northwest from Susanville. Then, Heppner is directly north from Ritter. To run south from Ritter would carry the road away from Heppner, not towards it.

Again, the trade of the Susanville region is not extensive. It is excellent, so far as its volume goes. The people are thrifty, good citizens, and desirable from every point of view as customers. But, the entire trade of the Susanville region would not justify building a wagon road through the mountains for one-third the distance claimed for this alleged projected road from Heppner.

These Are the Facts.

At this time, the trade of the John Day country is divided between Pendleton, Heppner, with some to Baker county towns from the further portions of Grant county. Pendleton gets the bulk in the region naturally tributary. Heppner gets the trade in the region naturally tributary. The trade in the portions nearer to each town will never be taken away by the other town. There is a neutral territory, of which the Susanville district is a comparatively small part. At Susanville are not more than 40 or 50 men employed in the mines. There are a few stockmen and a few farmers. The only tonnage that comes out is livestock and a little ore. Absolutely nothing else comes from that portion of the south country that lies in and near Susanville. There is no tonnage outcoming that any railroad would worry over to the extent of dipping into local matters sufficiently to engage in wagon road building.

In-Going Tonnage.

The tonnage going into the Susanville region is not extensive. It would be a desirable addition to the business of any town. But, even the people of that part of the country will not claim that it is of volume sufficient to warrant expending any very large sum of money in the building of roads. This is apparent from the fact that they did not ask that any town pay all the expenses of construction of the proposed roadways that were desired to be made towards this place.

Probably, the territory in dispute in the Susanville region buys about ten cars of merchandise per year. Not much more than that. If any more is needed to supply the district under discussion.

Pendleton is Not Asleep.

The business men of Pendleton are not asleep to their interests. Indeed, it is not necessary to assert that Pendleton's reputation is established, and her business men will not fail to expend any sums of money, that if expended, will bring return in trade sufficient to justify the expenditure. The Susanville matter will be attended to in a manner in keeping with the town's usual wideawake character.

Facts About Heppner.

Were Heppner to go after the Susanville trade, as she naturally would desire to do, she would not build a "75-mile road." That is a pipe dream. It is newspaper sensationalism and literary inaccuracy run mad. Furthermore, it would not be necessary, as anyone knows who has traveled through that country, a 75-mile road would bankrupt a town, if built through the mountains such as those that would have to be crossed between Susanville and Heppner, where steep grades prevail, and road-making is exceedingly difficult. Heppner would go at it in a different manner. She would merely construct a spur wagon road to the Susanville country from an excellent road that now connects Heppner with the other points in Grant county over which flows the heavy traffic that Heppner has with Grant county.

CLARENCE M. BRUNE ACCUSED BY MACDOWELL.

Husband of Minnie Tittel, Well Known Here, Charged With Defrauding and Drugging.

Owing to the fact that Minnie Tittel Brune, the actress, is well known personally to many Pendleton people, that her husband, a former banker of Colfax, Wash., named Brune, now known as Brune, is also familiar to people hereabouts, and that Melbourne MacDowell has appeared here at the Frazer, the following telegram from Kansas City will possess a peculiar interest:

Melbourne MacDowell, the actor, who ended an engagement here yesterday, signed a sensational deposition in Kansas City, Kan., yesterday in his suit against Clarence M. Brune, a theatrical manager, who last season starred his wife, Minnie Tittel Brune, and MacDowell in Sardou's play, "Theodora." MacDowell, in his deposition, swears that in New York, while intoxicated, he was induced to sign bills of sale conveying the rights of the Sardou plays to Brune for \$500. He asserts that fraud was used in bringing about the transaction, and asks that it be set aside.

The suit was filed in Ramsey county, Minnesota, and seeks to recover damages and to restrain Brune from producing any of the Sardou plays.

Other sensational statements are made by MacDowell in his deposition one being that he was drugged in New York, placed on a steamer and taken to Baltimore, where he was married when still under the influence of the drug.

AN EMPIRE IN ITSELF.

Eastern Oregon and Its Great Extent of Country.

A pamphlet has been issued by Frederick Haynes Newell, of the interior department, which shows some facts concerning Eastern Oregon that are worthy of note, says the Dalles Times-Mountaineer. It says there are 35,787,880 acres of vacant land in Oregon east of the Cascade mountains. This land, while it is not all susceptible of cultivation, is nevertheless, valuable for farming and grazing purposes.

Perhaps one-half of it could be reclaimed by irrigation and would furnish homes of 80 acres each, to 200,000 families. Continuing the pamphlet says:

"The greater part of the vacant public lands are within the great interior basin, the streams of which do not have sufficient volume to cut their way to the ocean. The supply of water is very small in comparison to the land to be supplied, and it will be necessary to use storage reservoirs and well water wherever it can be obtained, in order to utilize the land."

This section, however, is a great empire that will some day sustain an immense population. Whenever the government shall have taken hold of irrigation schemes for the reclamation of arid regions, it will begin to attract home-hunters and will sustain a population equal to that of the more thickly settled regions.

Carolina Lumbermen Organize.

Columbia, S. C., Jan. 10.—Lumbermen of South Carolina gathered here in considerable numbers today for the purpose of forming a state association to advance the interests of the trade. Preliminary business and discussions occupied the day. It is expected the organization will be completed tomorrow, when a president and other officers will be chosen.

To Meet in Debate.

Minneapolis, Jan. 10.—Much interest is manifested in the debate between representatives of the Universities of Chicago and Minnesota which takes place at the latter institution tonight. The question to be discussed is: "Resolved, that the action of the United States in granting suffrage to the negro was hasty and ill advised."
