

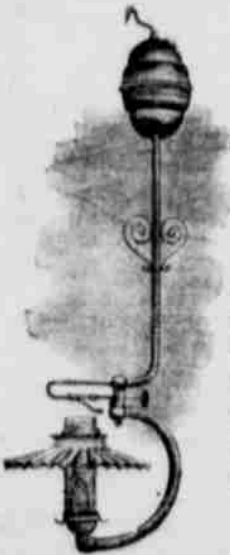

The "Miners' Mining Company," is the name of a new private corporation, the papers for which were filed with the county clerk yesterday. The company is composed of Dr. F. W. Vincent, T. C. Taylor, of this city, and John L. Land, of Baker City. The object of the incorporation is for the engaging in locating, purchasing, leasing or otherwise acquiring titles in mines, or handling any kind of business pertaining to the mining property, smelting and reducing ores, besides dealing in real estate, timber lands, etc.  
The principal office of the company is to be in Pendleton. The incorporation was formed for operating in Baker county, or elsewhere from time to time as the company may deem expedient. The capital stock is 600 shares at par value of \$50 each.

**FREEWATER WON**

**IN THE ARGUMENT FOR A NEW TOWN.**

**PENDLETON LAW-ABIDING.**

No One Has Been Disorderly Since the New Year Began.  
Not a fine for disorderly conduct in police court since the second day of January. This is a remarkable record, but nevertheless is true, as shown by the police court records.

"Never, in the history of Pendleton, or at least in the four years that I have been chief of police, have I known any such record to have been approached," said John Heathman, to an East Oregonian reporter yesterday. He continued: "Since the holidays there have practically been no arrests made of drunks. This is a new departure from the ordinary and I cannot account for it. It has been very quiet."

**DEATH OF JAMES M'COOL— WAS A NATIVE OF IRELAND.**

Died in Walla Walla on Friday—The Funeral Tomorrow.

Walla Walla, Jan. 11.—James McCool, a wealthy farmer, died very suddenly yesterday at his home in this city. Mr. McCool was on the streets the day previous in his usual health. A sudden illness attacked him and he died after several hours of very severe suffering, heart disease being the immediate cause of death. Mr. McCool was born in Ireland in 1857. Three years later his parents brought him to this valley, where he had since resided. He leaves a wife but no children. Funeral services will be held at St. Patrick's church tomorrow at 10 o'clock. Father M. Flohr officiating.

**CHANGE IN FREIGHT RATES.**

New Classification Takes Effect Tomorrow on Trunk Line Roads.

New York, Jan. 11.—Changes in official freight classifications affecting several hundred articles and operative over all the trunk line railroads takes effect tomorrow. Most of the changes do not alter the previous classification, consisting principally of the addition or elimination of specifications as to how the merchandise affected shall be packed, etc., of changes in the minimum carload weights, and of the application of certain new rules. All of these changes, however, result practically in a change, to a greater or less degree in the rates. Packinghouse products are affected most.

**COOL WHEN SHE SAW**

**ALEXANDER SUICIDE.**

May Cupples Took Her Time Before Telling Police.

St. Louis, Jan. 11.—May Cupples, charged with manslaughter in assisting Edward Alexander, a young man enamored of her, to suicide, was acquitted today. She admitted Alexander had told her he intended to kill himself, and that she saw him swallow a dose of morphine, but that she made no effort to prevent him or to summon aid until it was too late. She said she took a bath, combed her hair and dressed herself before informing anyone that Alexander had taken poison.

**Captain Jobe Released.**

Columbus, O., Jan. 11.—Captain I. T. Jobe was released from the penitentiary today by virtue of a commutation of sentence. Captain Jobe was one of the most noted federal prisoners in the penitentiary. He was a volunteer soldier during the Spanish-American war and was arrested for feloniously using transportation blanks belonging to the government. While confined in the Columbus jail he made his escape and when apprehended was found to be suffering from injuries received during the war. This resulted in his sentence being placed at two years. He has never recovered from his injuries, and for this reason indictments against him in the United States courts in New York City were recently dismissed.

**First Wheat for Denmark.**

Portland, Jan. 11.—The British steamship Java has been chartered to load at this port for Copenhagen direct. She is a 6000-ton carrier. During the past season cargoes have been cleared from Portland for South America, South Africa, Siberia, the Orient, Germany, France and other European ports, but this is the first appearance of Denmark buyers in the market for a direct shipment. The Java will carry a full cargo of wheat from the Walla Walla district to supply the shortage in the Danish crop.

**Texas Labor Convention.**

Waco, Texas, Jan. 11.—Many delegates and other visitors are arriving in Waco to attend the annual convention of the Texas State Federation of Labor. In the matter of attendance the meeting promises to be the largest gathering of its kind ever held in the state. A long list of subjects affecting labor interests has been prepared for consideration. During their stay in the city the visitors will be entertained by the Central Labor Council.

**Changes on the Great Northern.**

St. Paul, Jan. 11.—A number of changes among officials of the Great Northern road were made today. J. W. Blabon, general Western traffic manager, assumed the duties of vice-president, succeeding Darius Miller, who becomes vice-president of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad. Mr. Blabon's place of general Western traffic manager is filled by the promotion of John C. Eden, heretofore traffic manager of the Eastern Railway of Minnesota.

**Lynched a Negro.**

Springfield, Ky., Jan. 11.—Jim Mayes, a negro accused of attempting to assault a white girl, was taken from the jail by a mob early this morning and hanged.
