On Sunday he took down bottle supposed by him to contain he medicine, took a teaspoonful, and in a few minutes was dead. days ago the strychnine bottle was broken and the drug was placed in an ordinary medicine bottle, nearly the one used to contain salts.

Mr. Fields had lived in Walla Walla county many years, and was a highly respected and well-to-do citizen. The funeral services were held yesterday at the country home.
