"FOR HER SAKE"—PLAY TO BE HERE TOMORROW NIGHT



The play which comes to the Frazer tomorrow, Wednesday night, "For Her Sake," is laid in Russia, the realm of the "Emperor of all the Russias," who with his family, appears in this picture. The play attracts special attention because of the recent lecture on Russia and Siberia by Captain Alberti, so that the announcement of the advance agent of the company "For Her Sake" is the more to be noted. He says: Certainly the story of the new Russo-Siberian four-act melodrama, "For Her Sake," the play which is to entertain the patrons of the Frazer tomorrow night, will commend itself as full of promise in that sort of material which the patrons know as "heart interest." It is the story of true love which does not "run smooth"—the old, old story, which, under the deft hand of the skillful dramatist is made over to seem new. The story of this play has a setting, however, which, if not wholly novel, is yet susceptible of treatment that must place it in the class of novelties among things theatrical. The plot hinges on the love of a Russian prince of the blood

for a lowly peasant girl—a serf. "Diga," the serf girl, has been brought up in the household of Prince Valdemar Radetsky, a nobleman of the right impulses and great courage. He falls in love with the peasant girl. She returns his love. It is the story of the consequences of the violation of the stern law of caste, nowhere more inexorable than in Russia. There are plots against the prince and against the woman of his choice, plots in which members of his own family figure, as well as a villainous member of the "third section," the secret police of the czar's dominion. It is a complicated story, though clearly and convincingly worked out, according to all accounts.

TOOK STRYCHNINE FOR SALTS AND DIED.

Fletcher Fields, of Walla Walla County, Suffered Horribly Before His Death.

Walla Walla, Jan. 14.—By mistake taking strychnine for salts, Fletcher Fields, a farmer residing on Russell creek, in this county, lost his life Sunday. The accident is peculiarly distressing on account of the advanced age of the deceased, and of the horrible suffering which followed the swallowing of the drug.

Mr. Fields was 60 years of age and has for some time suffered with eczema. For the disease he used salts in small doses. On Sunday he took down a bottle supposed by him to contain the medicine, took a teaspoonful, and in a few minutes was dead. A few days ago the strychnine bottle was broken and the drug was placed in an ordinary medicine bottle, nearly like the one used to contain salts.

Mr. Fields had lived in Walla Walla county many years, and was a highly respected and well-to-do citizen. The funeral services were held yesterday at the country home.

An increase of \$24,000,000 in the assessed valuation of all the property in the state, as compared with last year, is shown by the assessment summaries for 1921, filed in the office of the secretary of state. Owing to an increase of about \$500,000 in the exemptions, the net increase in the value of taxable property is \$23,500,000. The total value of taxable property is now \$141,398,513.96, as against \$117,894,874.12 in 1920. The total valuation is now higher than it has been in five years before.
